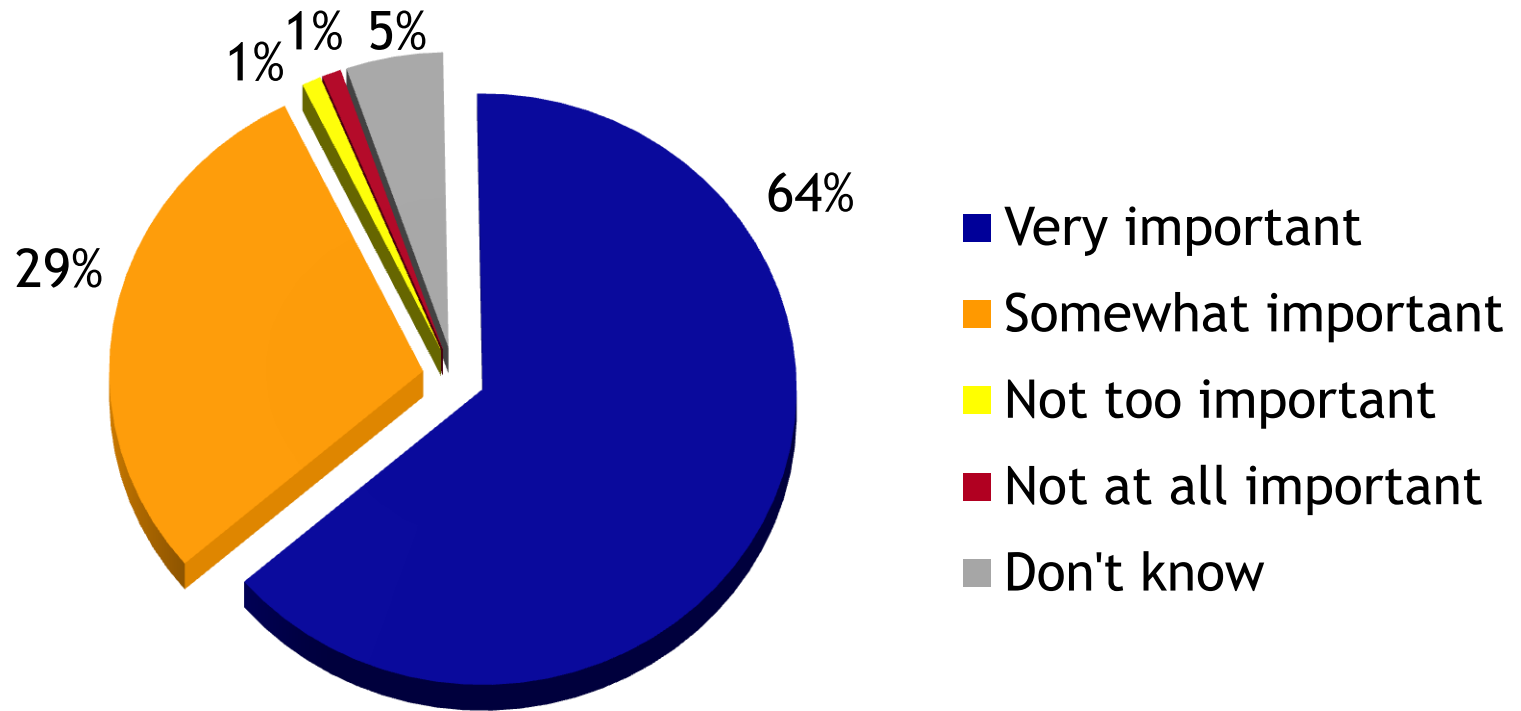
Public Opinion Polls

 - Sample size: 832 registered voters
 - Theoretical sampling error: +/- 4%

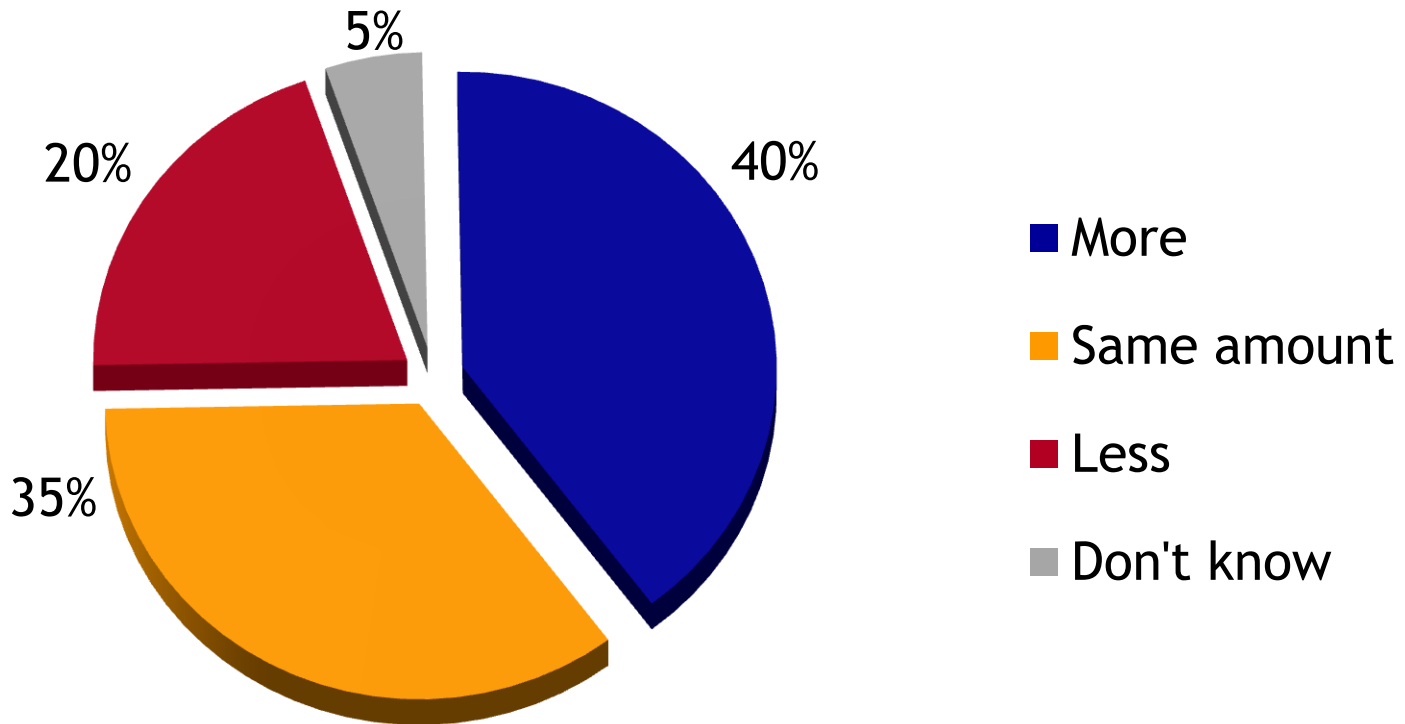

Many Marylanders Say Research is in the News More Today

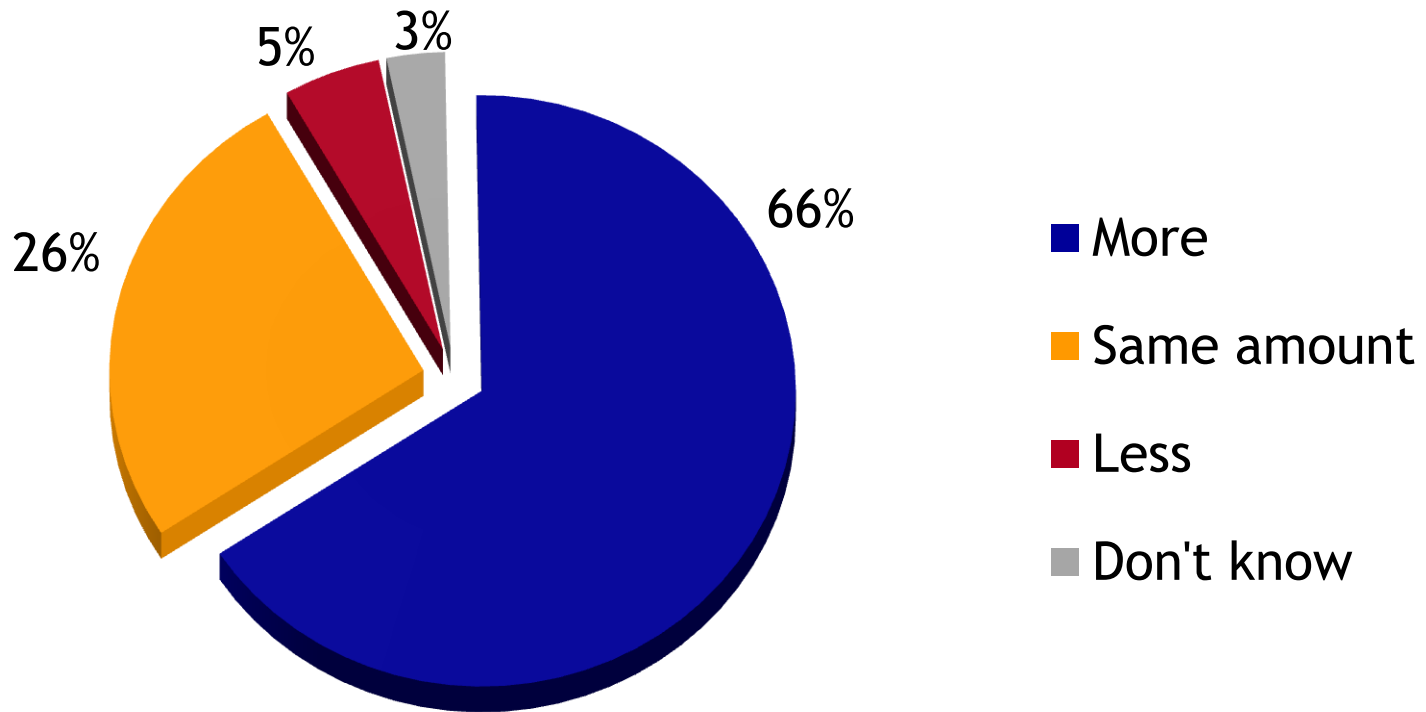
Compared to five years ago, would you say you hear or read more, less, or about the same amount about research in the news?

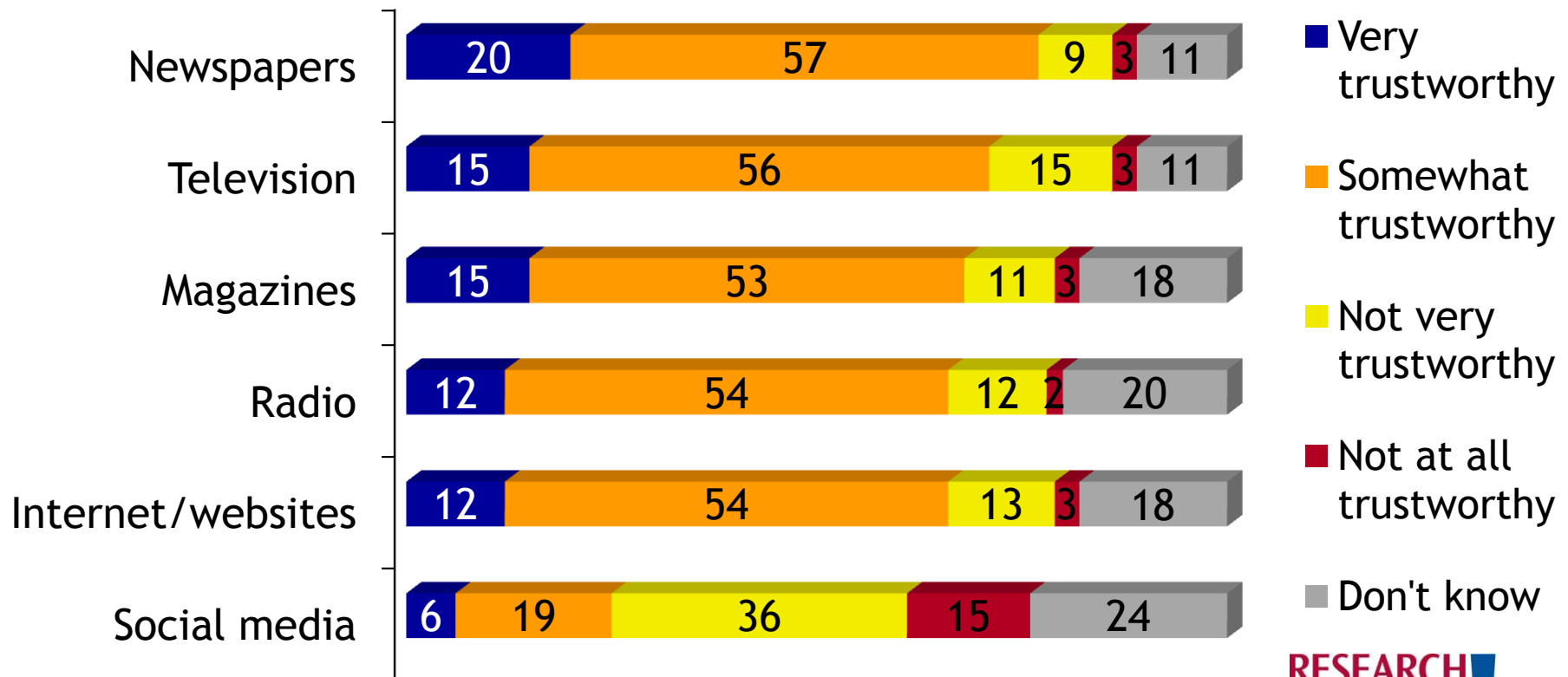
Marylanders Most Frequently Used News Sources

Traditional Media Considered Most Trustworthy About Research

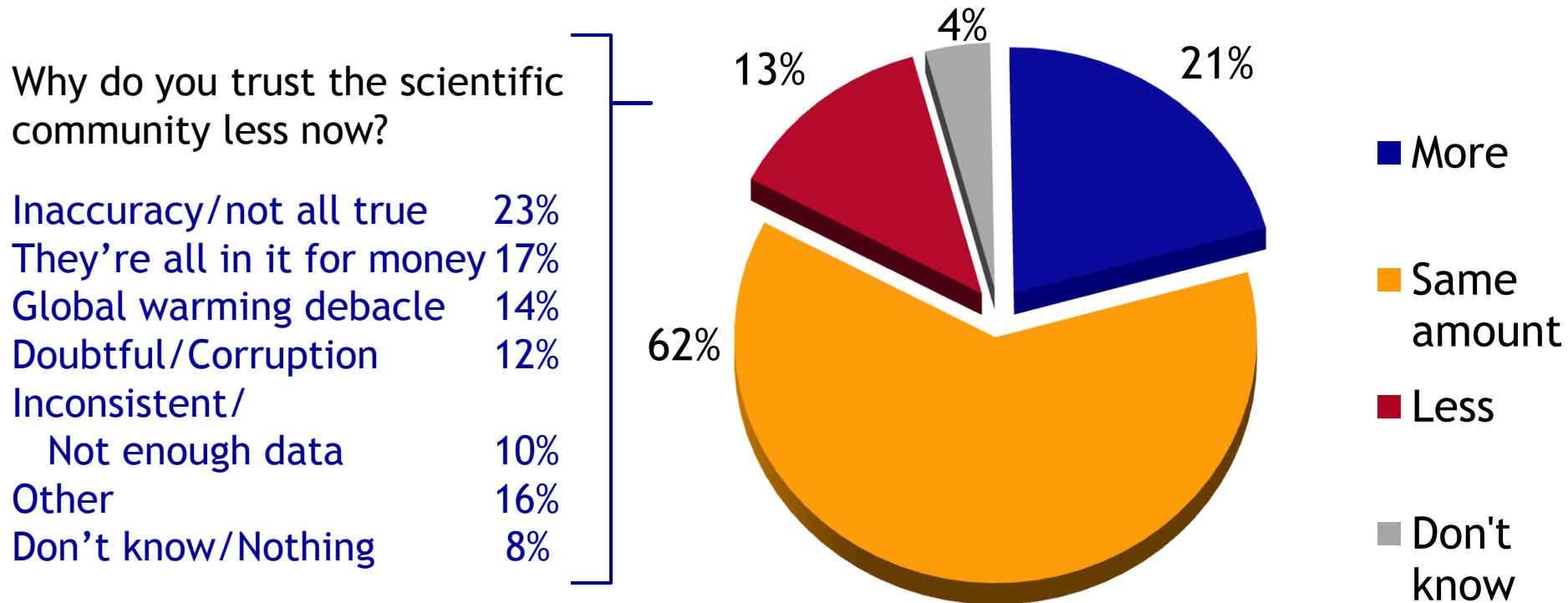
There are many sources of information about health and medical research issues. For each of the following sources, please indicate how trustworthy you think the information they provide is.

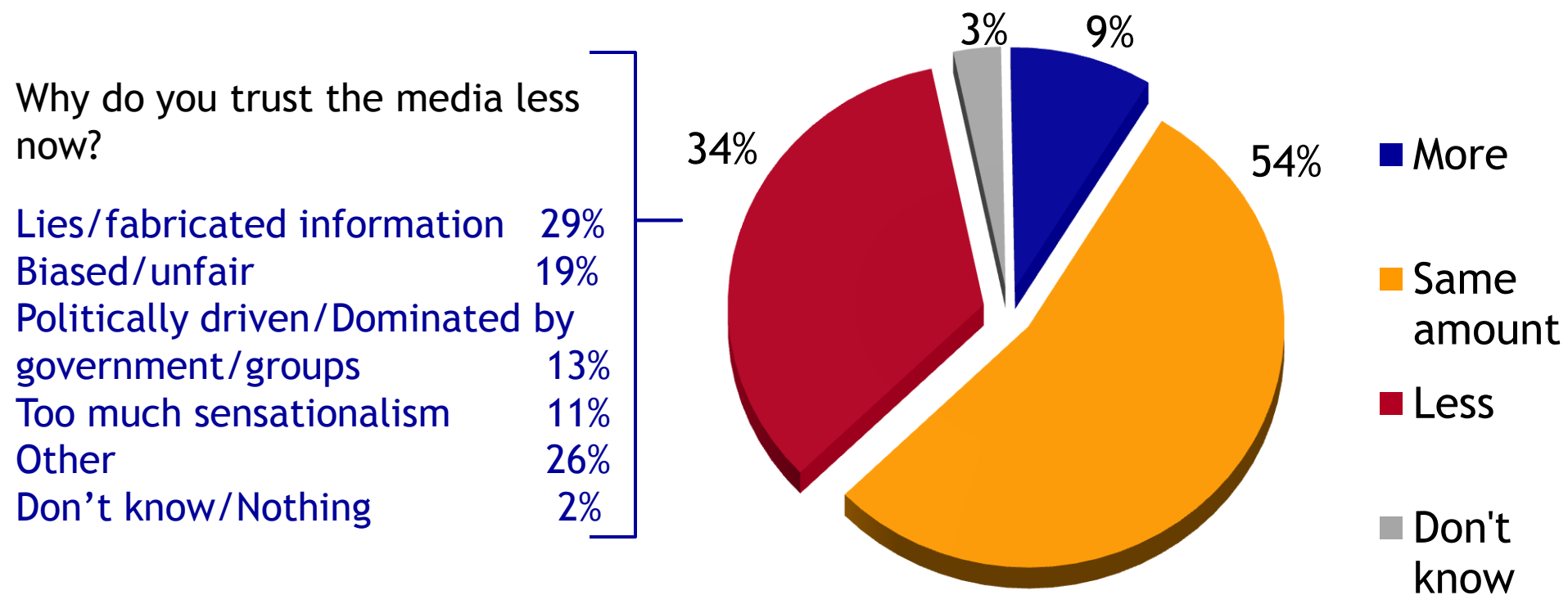
Compared to five years ago, would you say you trust the scientific community more, less, or about the same amount?

Trust of Media

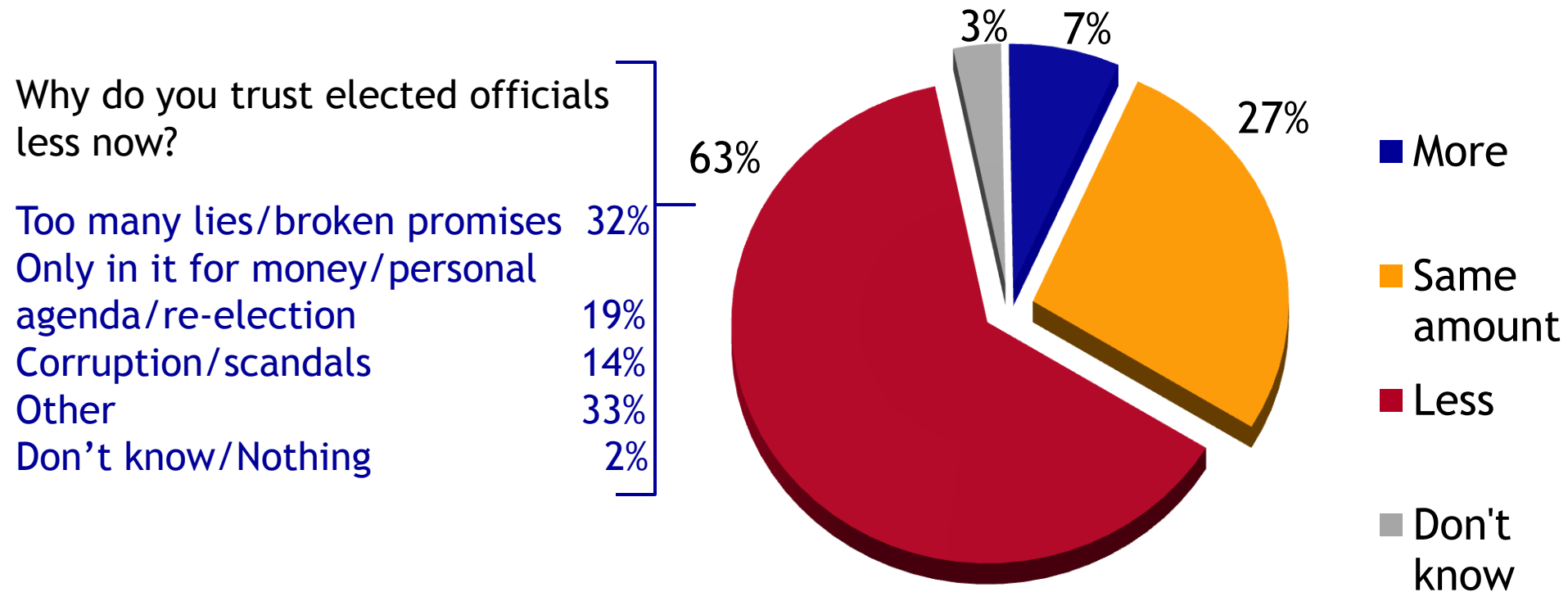
Compared to five years ago, would you say you trust the scientific community more, less, or about the same amount?

Trust of Elected Officials

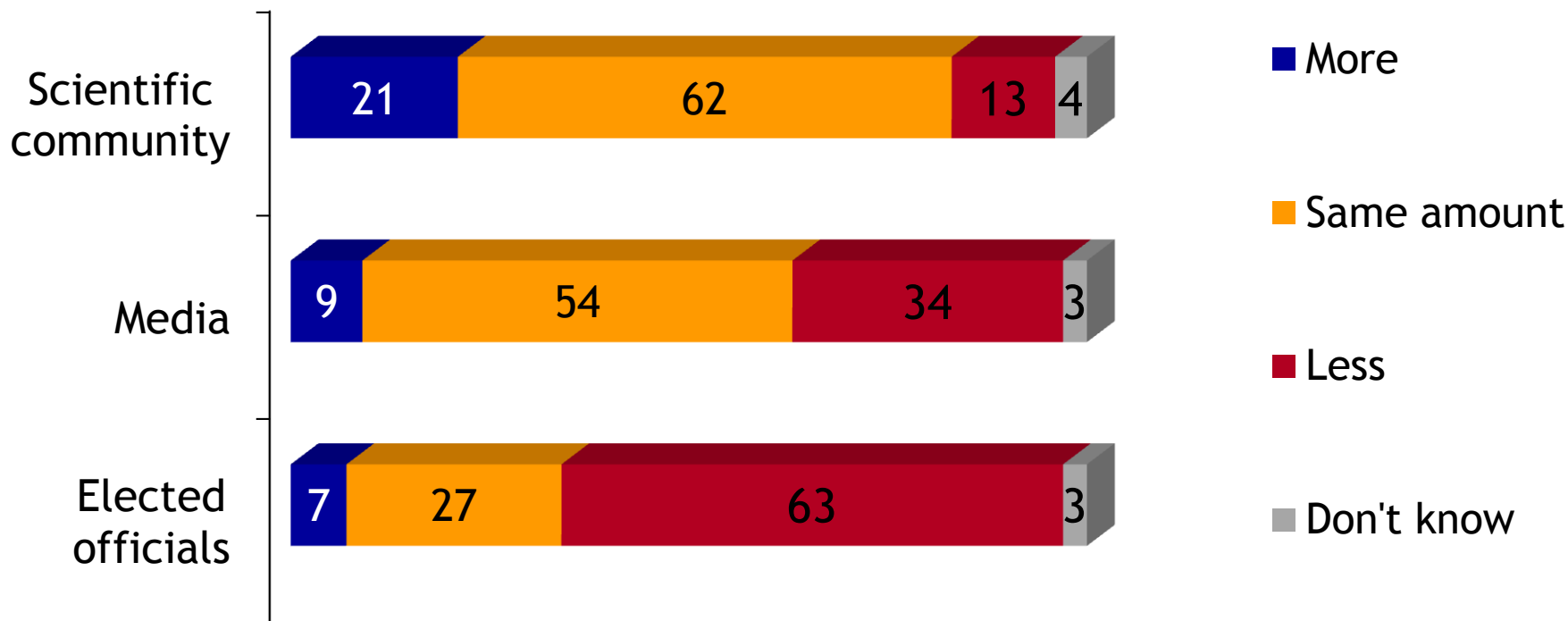
Compared to five years ago, would you say you trust your elected officials more, less, or about the same amount?

Trust Compared to 5 Years Ago

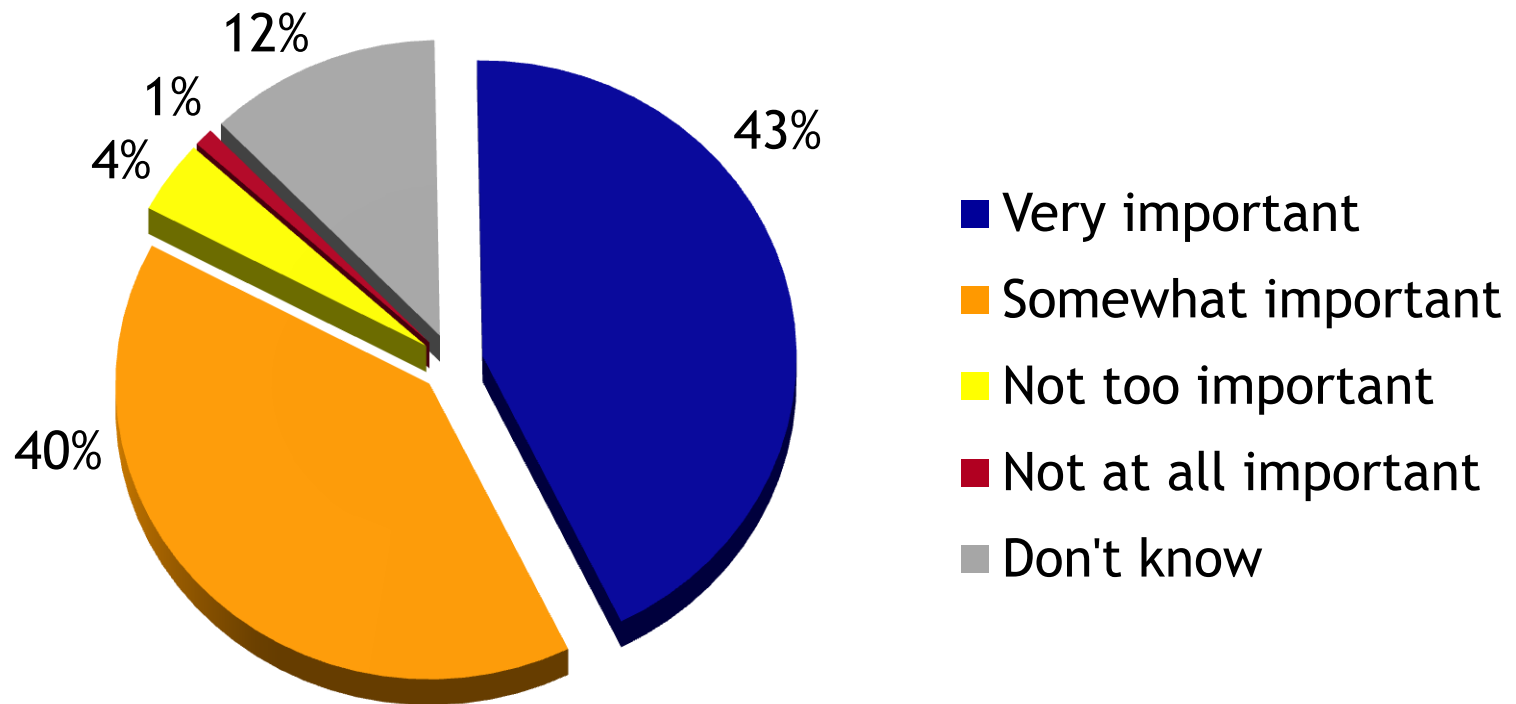
Compared to five years ago, would you say you trust the following more, less, or about the same amount?

Scientific Research Important to Maryland's Economy

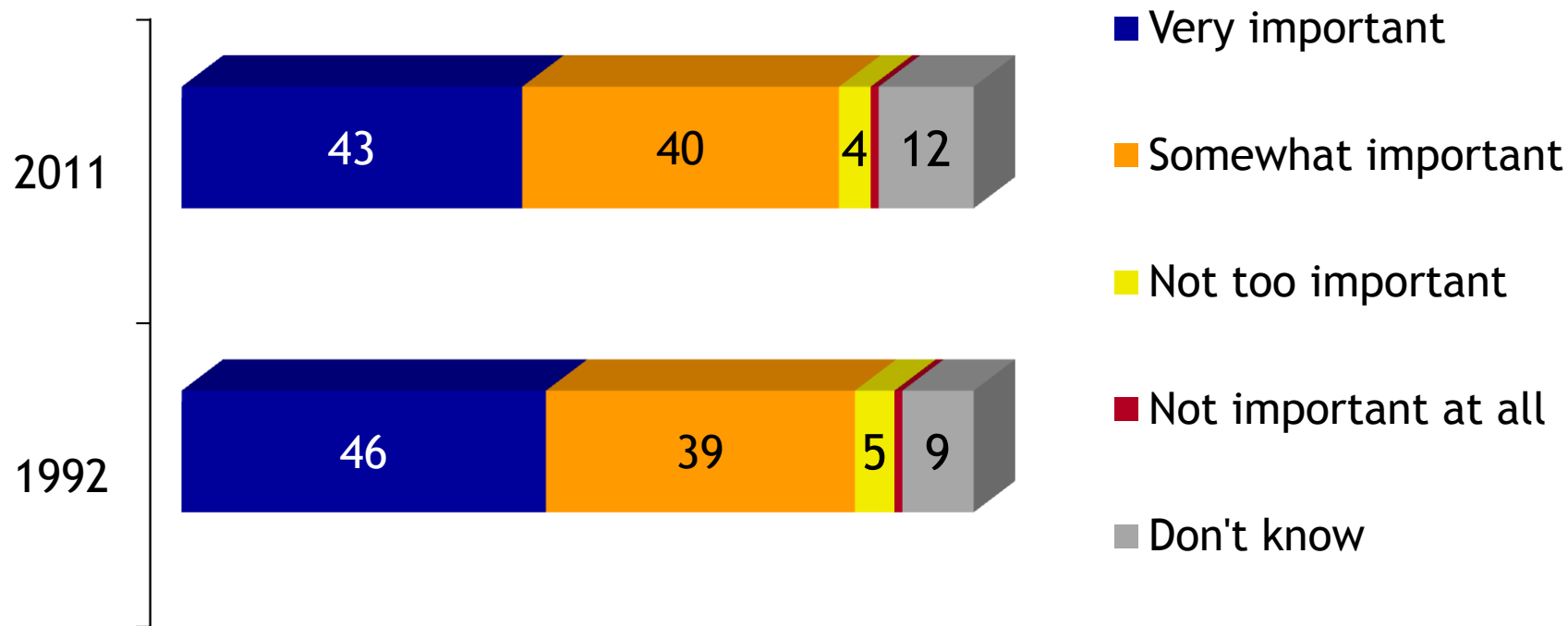
In terms of jobs and incomes, how important do you think spending money on scientific research is to Maryland's economy?

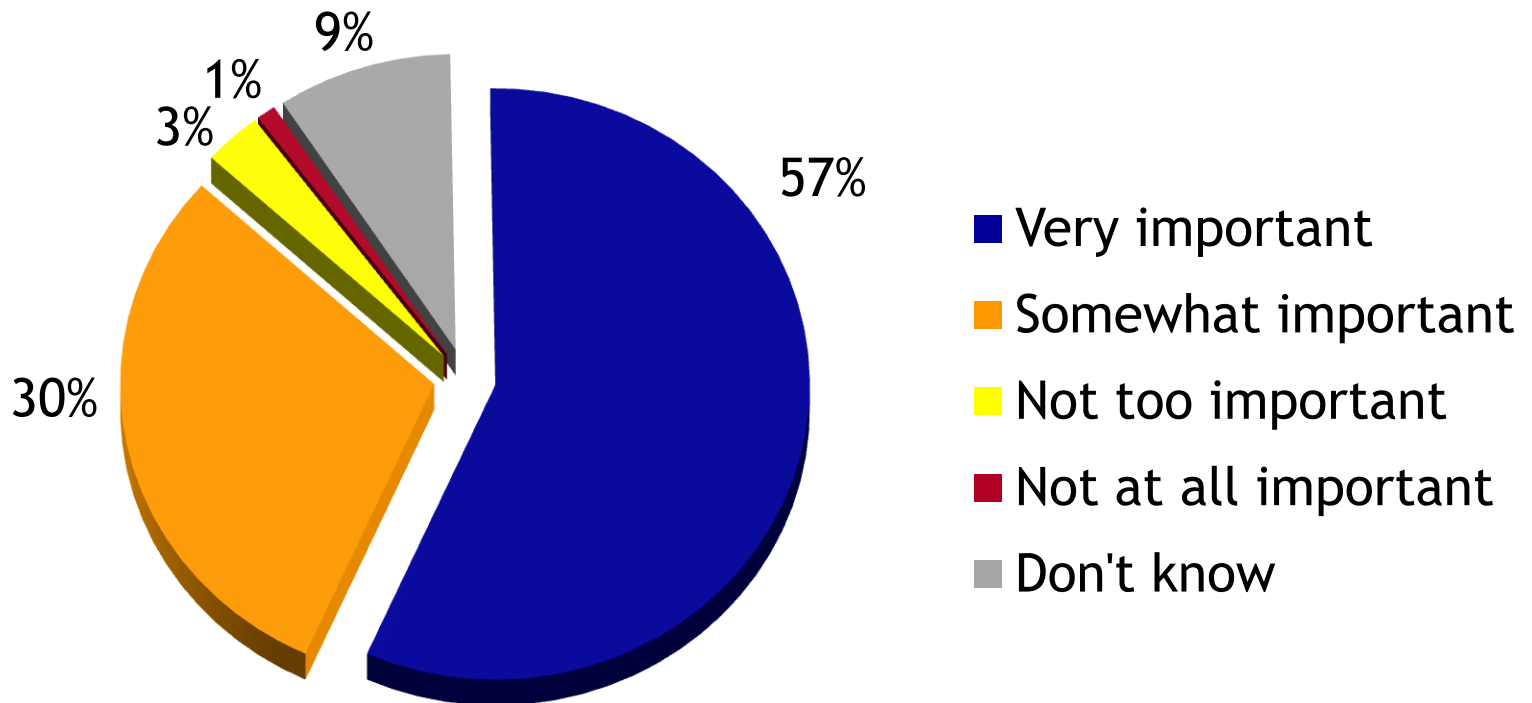
In terms of jobs and incomes, how important do you think spending money on scientific research is to Maryland's economy?

Very Important for Maryland to Be a Leader in Research

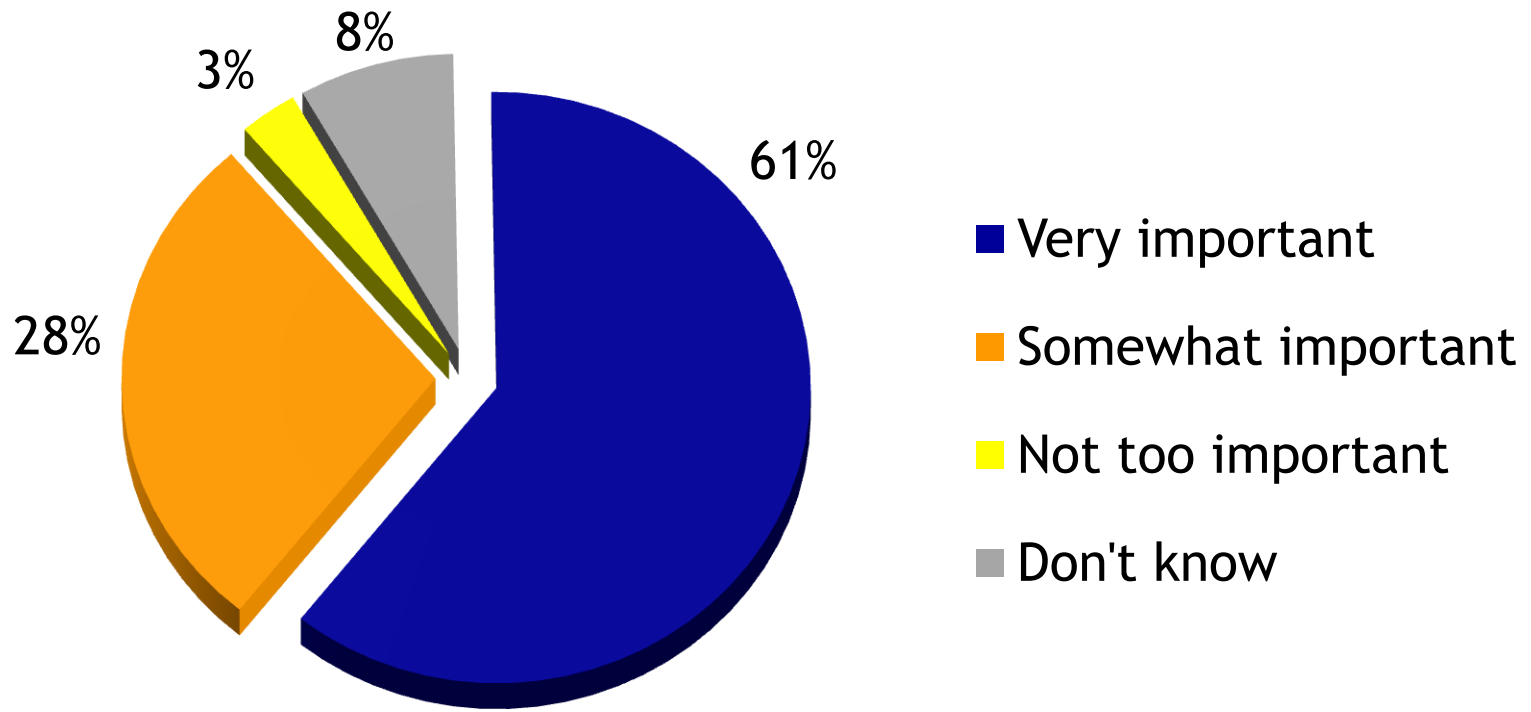
How important is it for Maryland to be a leader in science and medical research?

Very Important for Maryland to Be a Leader in Public Health Research

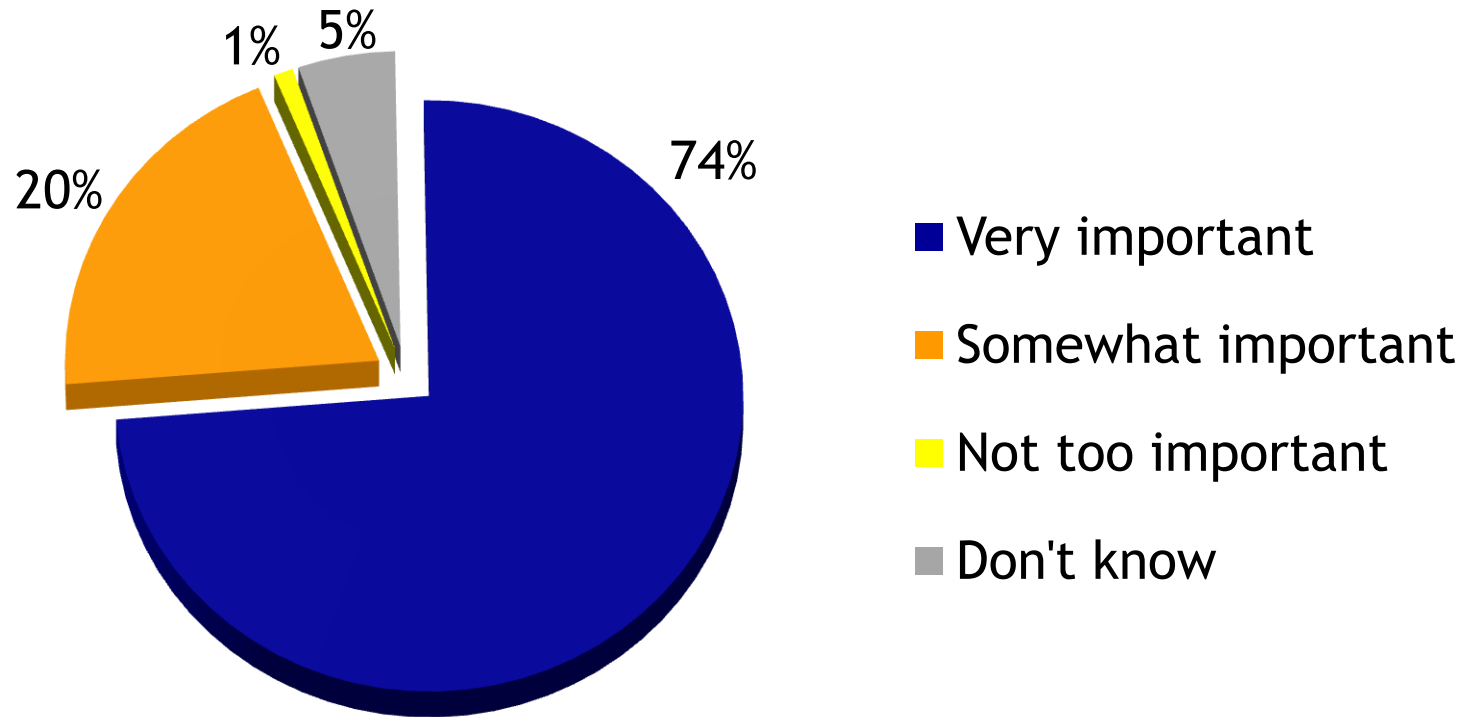
How important is it for Maryland to be a leader in public health, prevention and wellness research?

STEM Education Very Important to U.S. Competitiveness

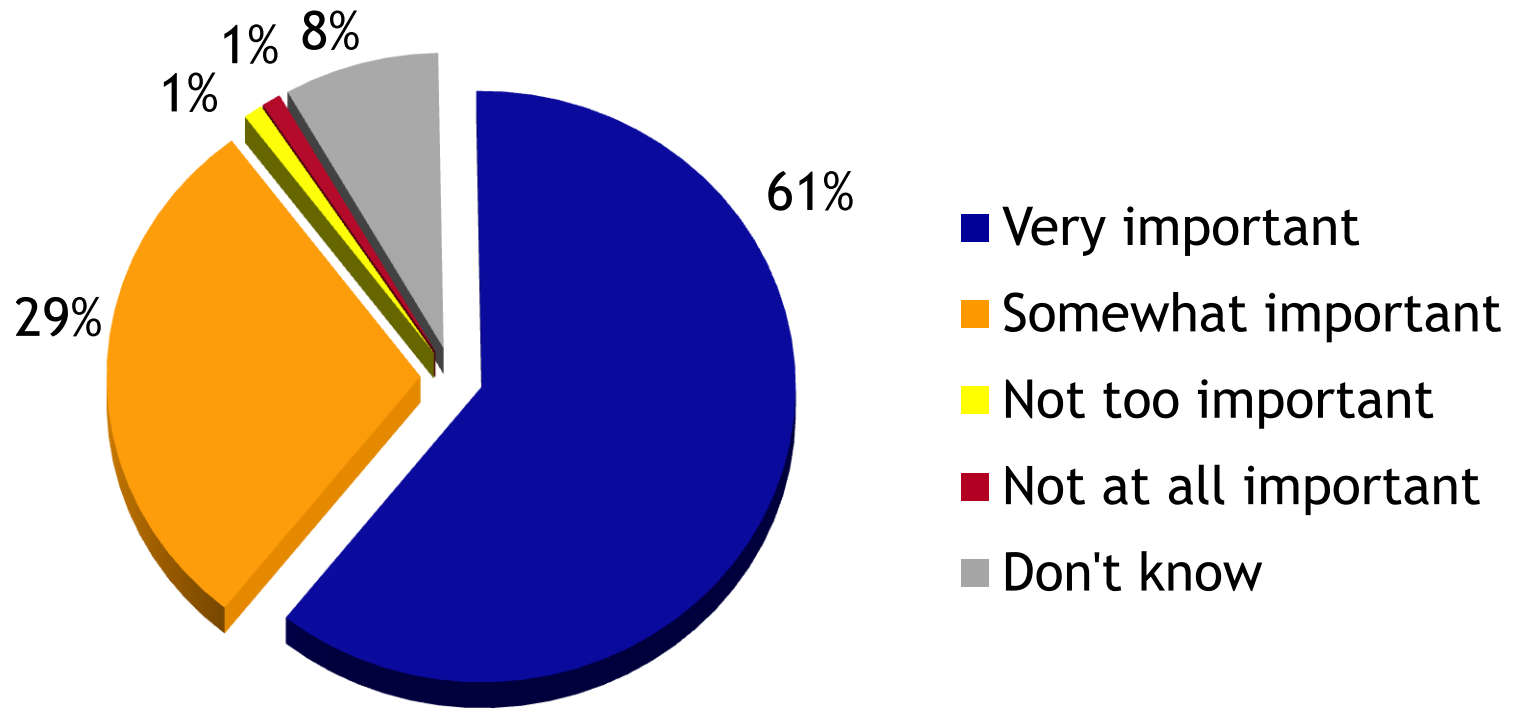
How important do you think education and training in science, technology, engineering and mathematics is to U.S. competitiveness and our future economic prosperity?

Very Important to Create Science Career Opportunities in Maryland

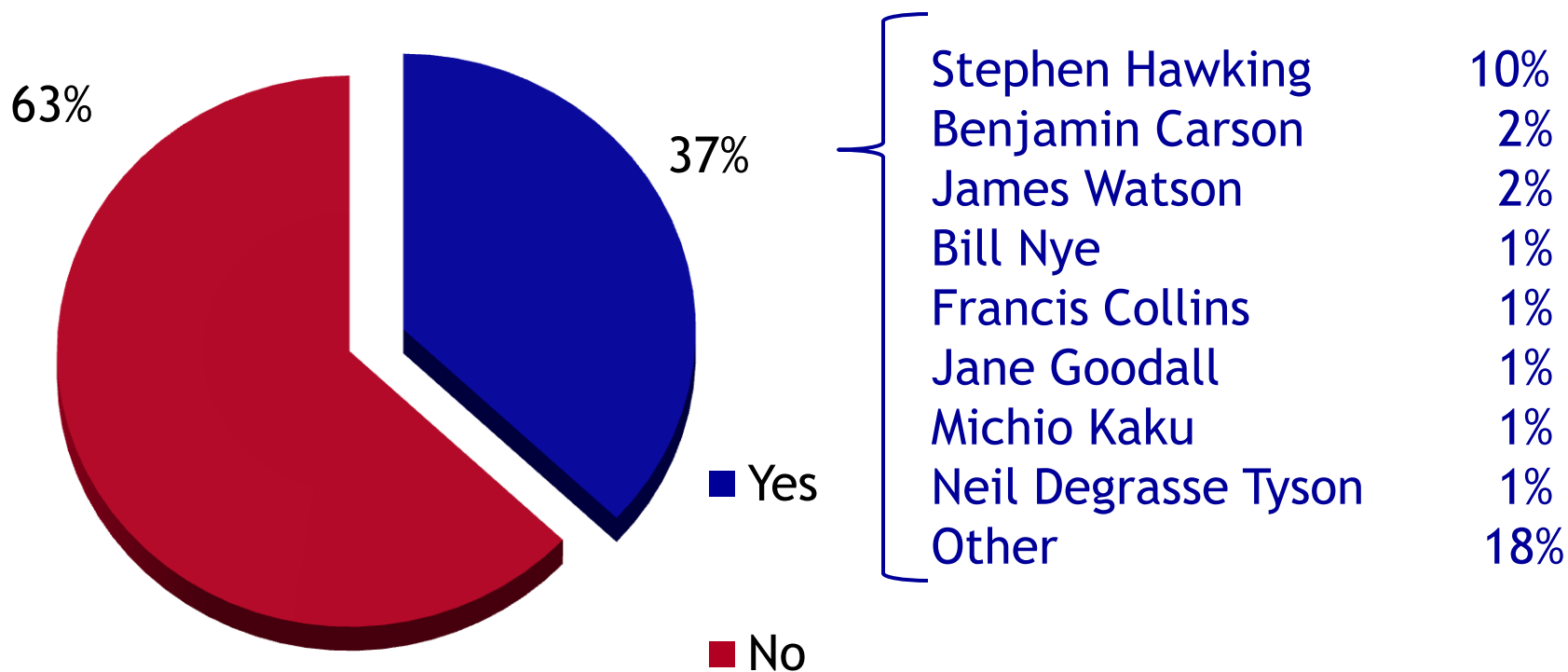
How important is it for Maryland to create more opportunities for careers in science and research for its young people?
