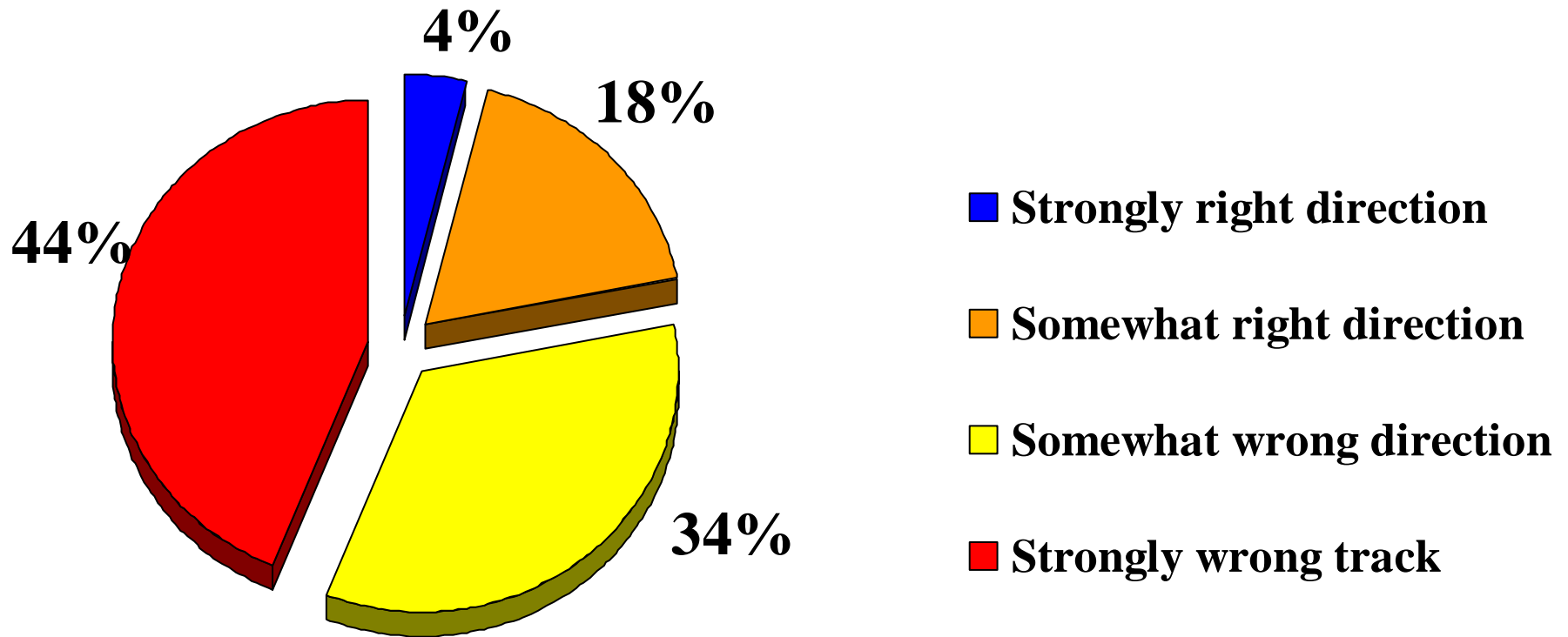


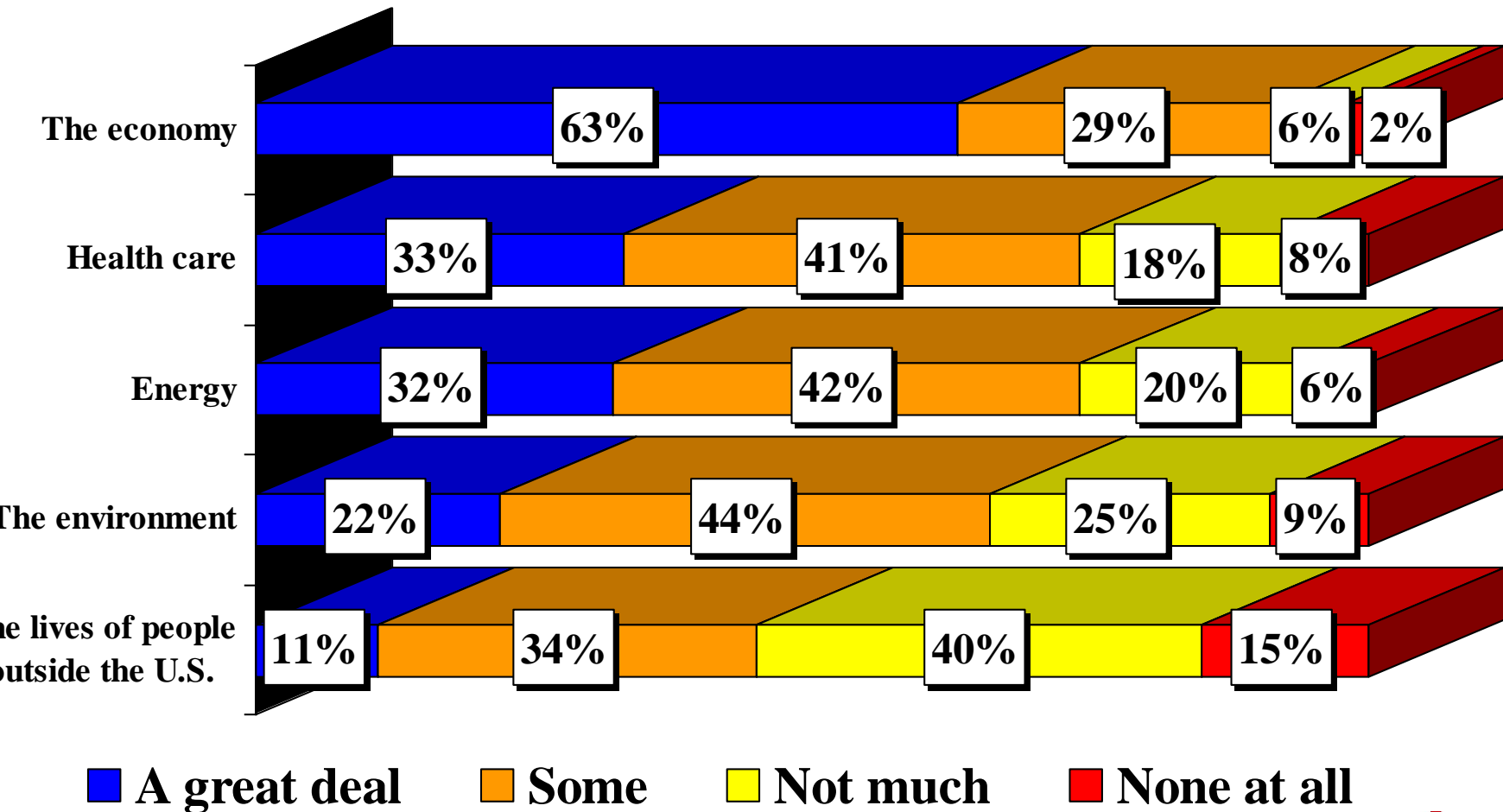
# U.S. is on the Wrong Track

In the last 24 hours, how much attention would you say you have paid to:

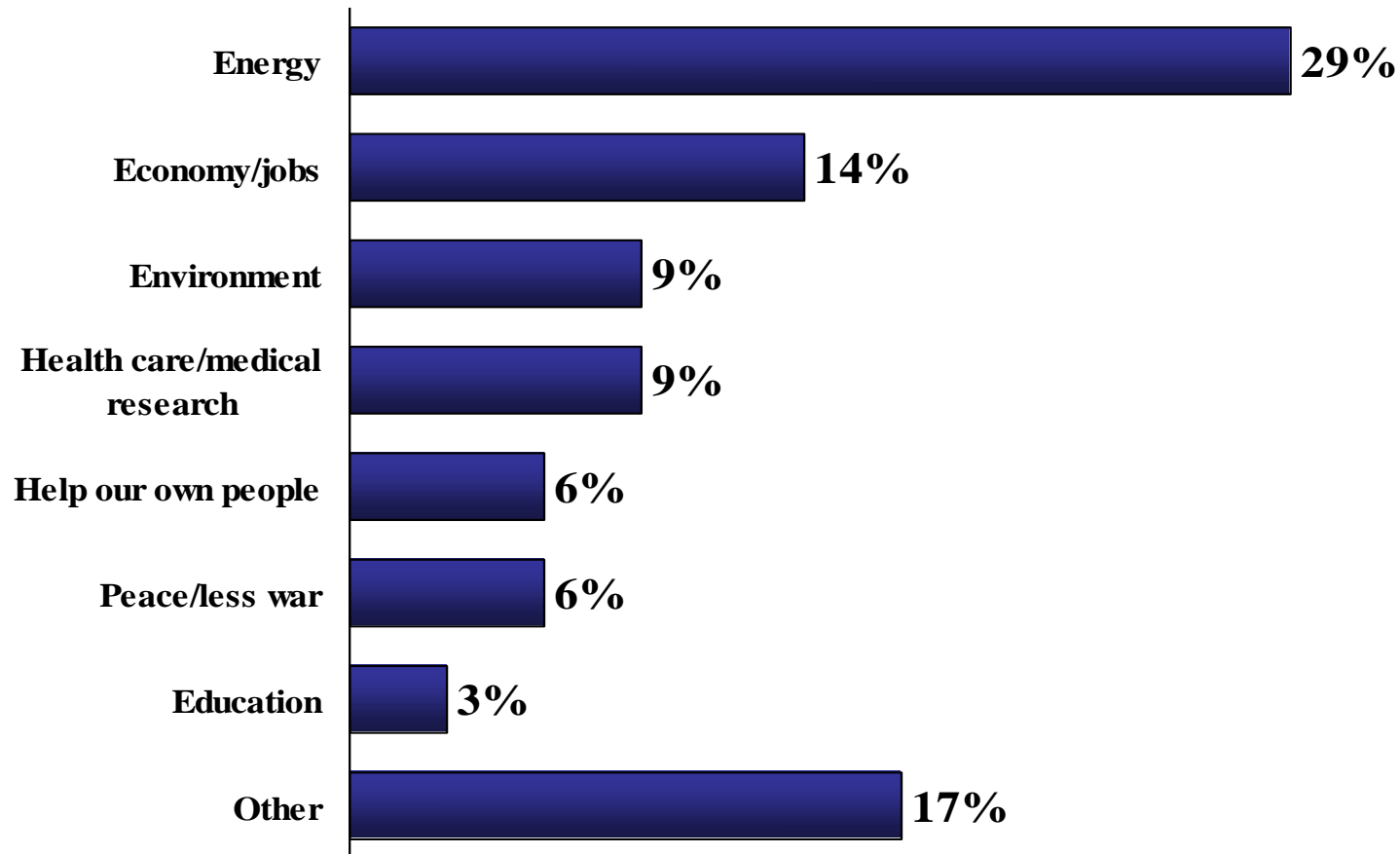

# U.S. Should Invest in the Future

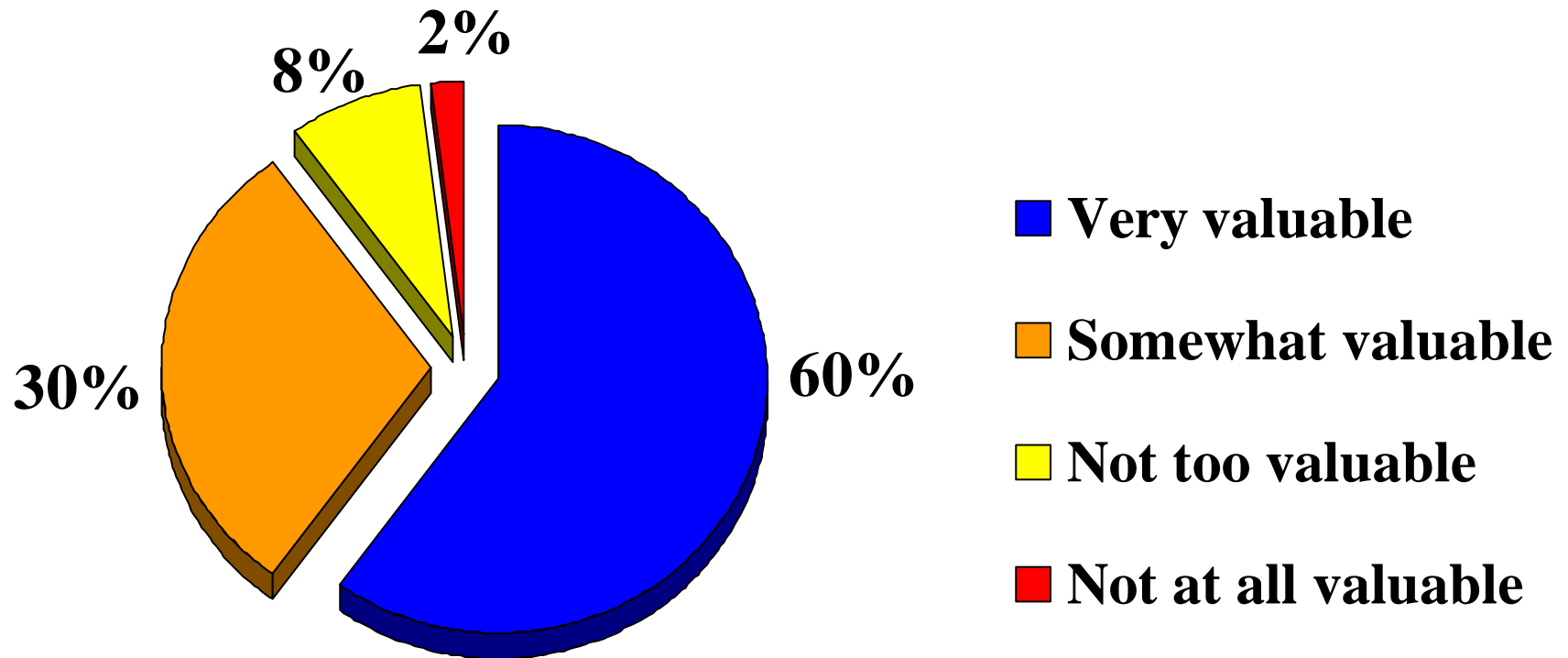
If the U.S. decided to invest in one thing to really make a difference in the world, what do you think that one thing should be? (*first mentions*)

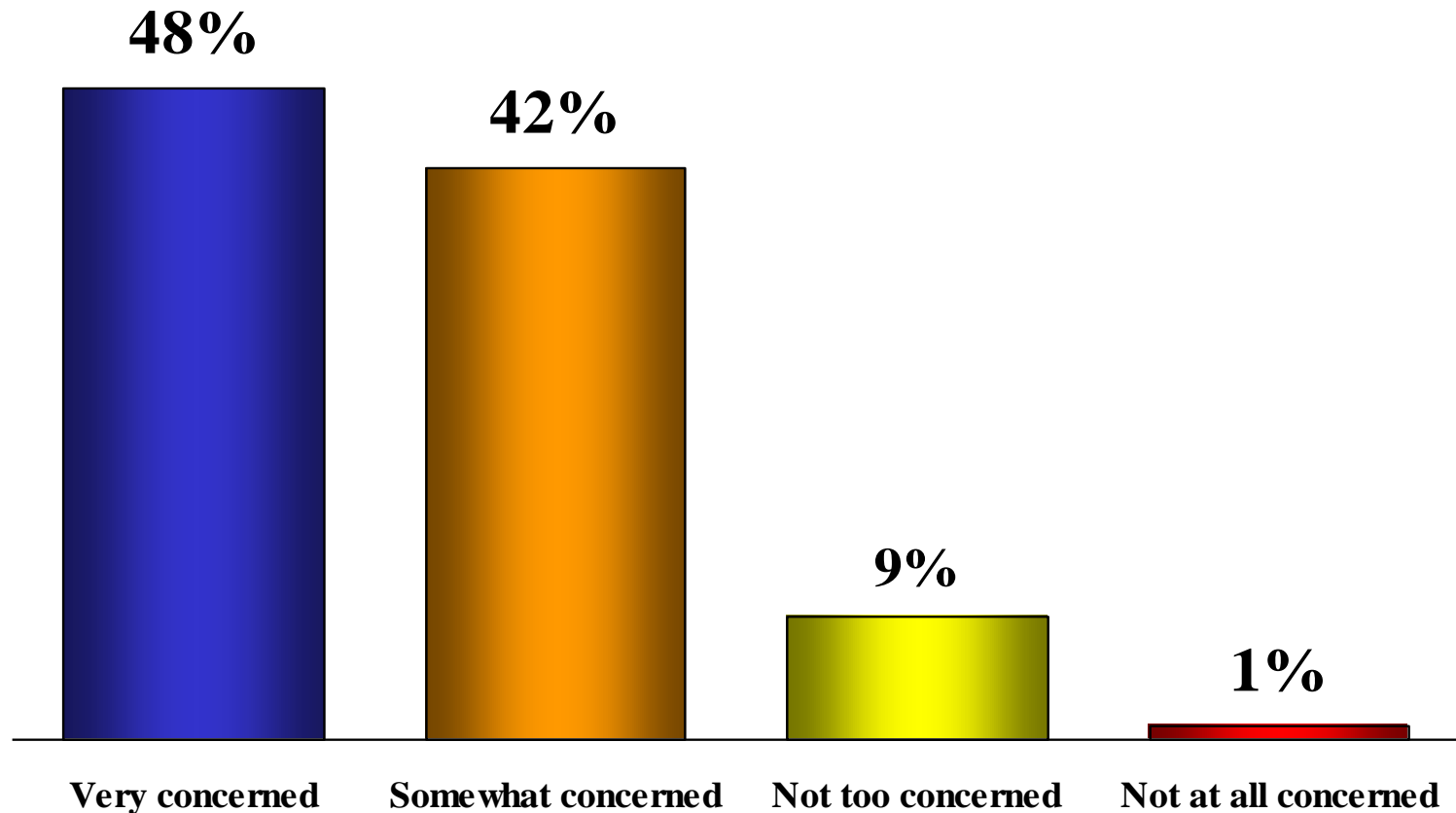
# Americans Want to Improve How the World Sees U.S.

# Americans Concerned About Health Problems Facing the World

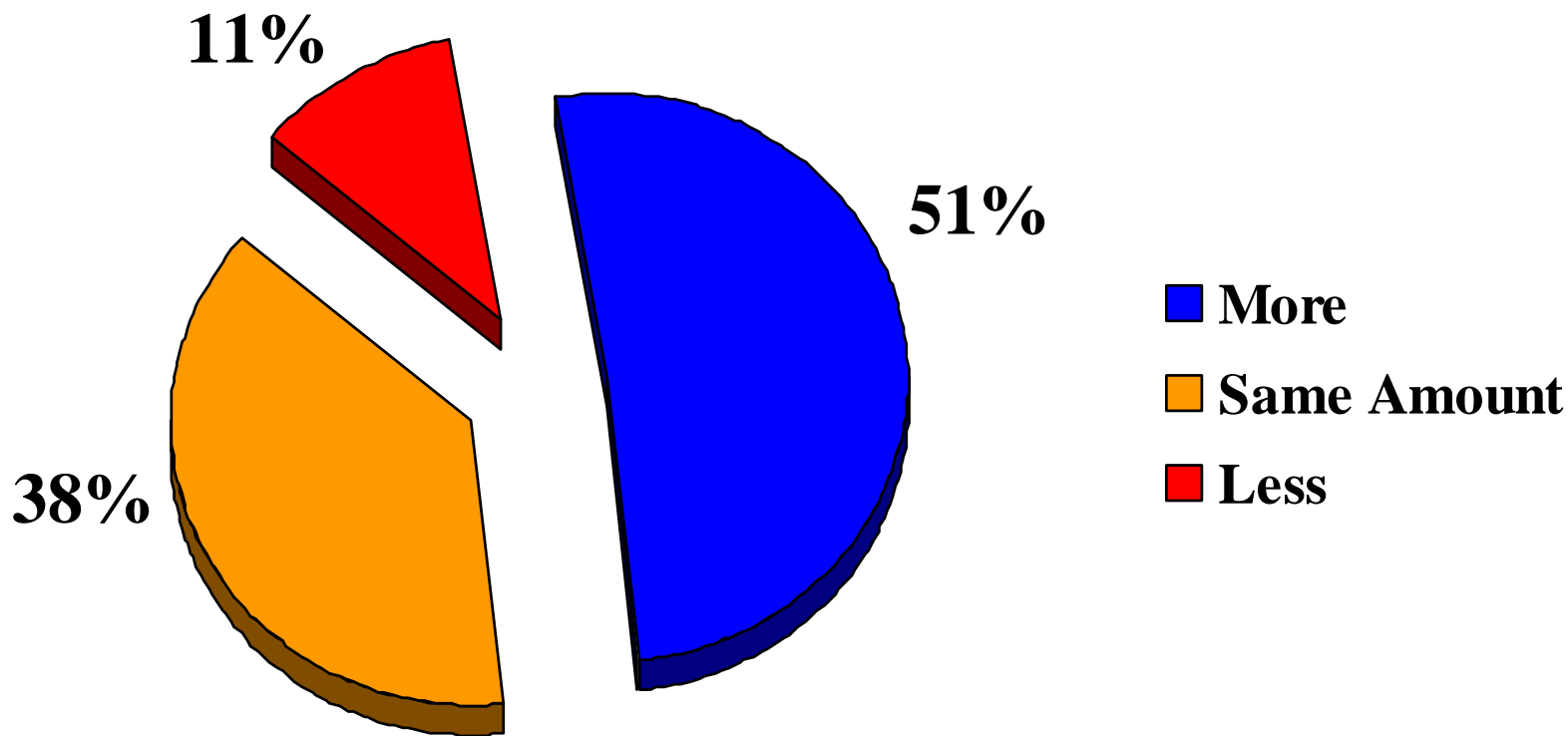
How concerned are you about the health problems facing the world today?

# Americans More Aware of Global Health Today

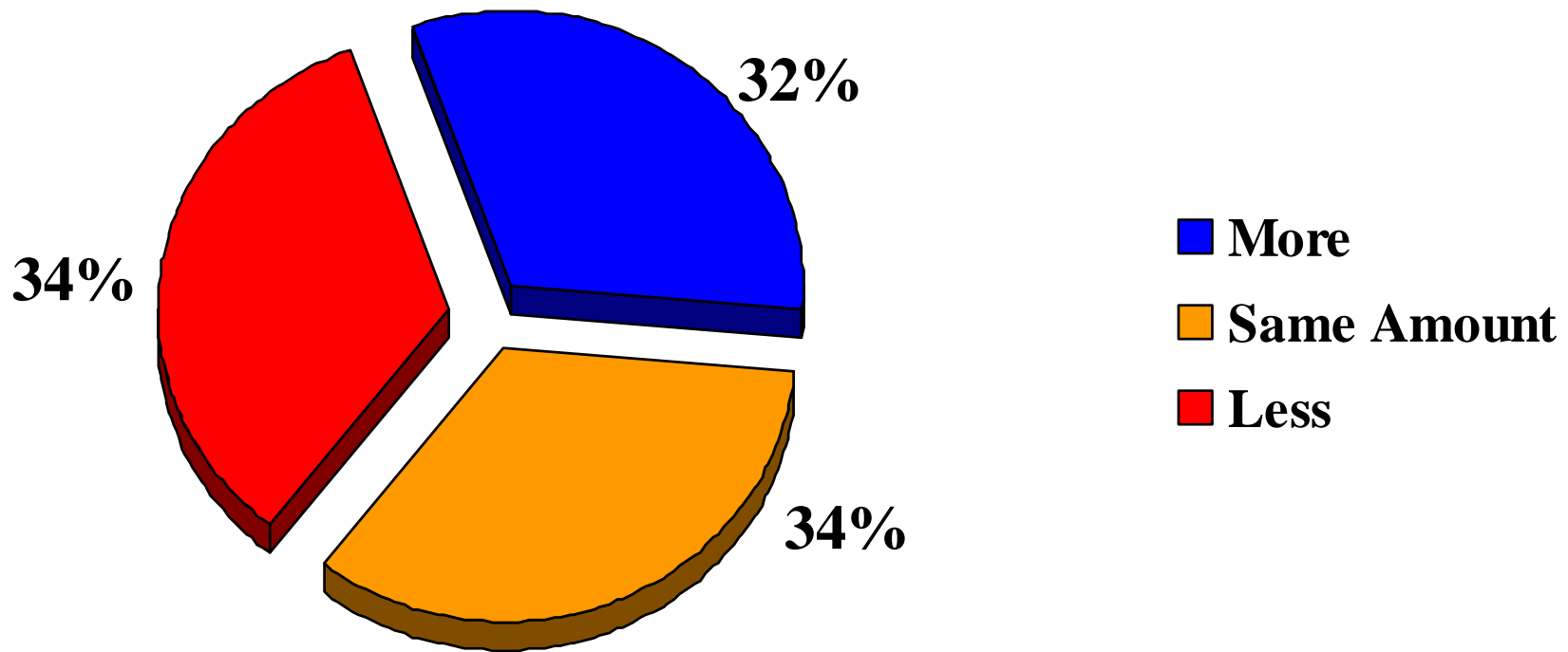
Compared to five years ago, would you say you think more, less, or about the same amount about global health?

# Americans Unsure How Elected Officials Perceive Global Health

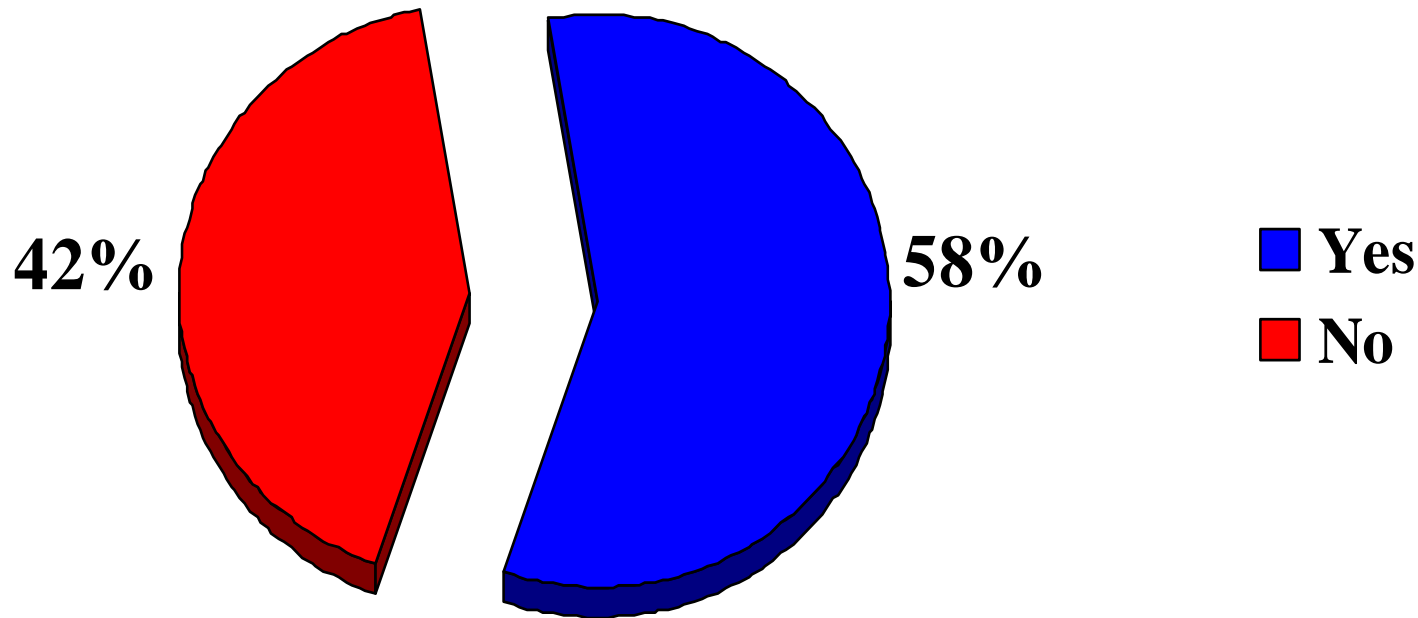
Compared to five years ago, do you think *your elected officials* think more, less, or about the same amount about global health?

Should global health be a top priority for the new Congress?

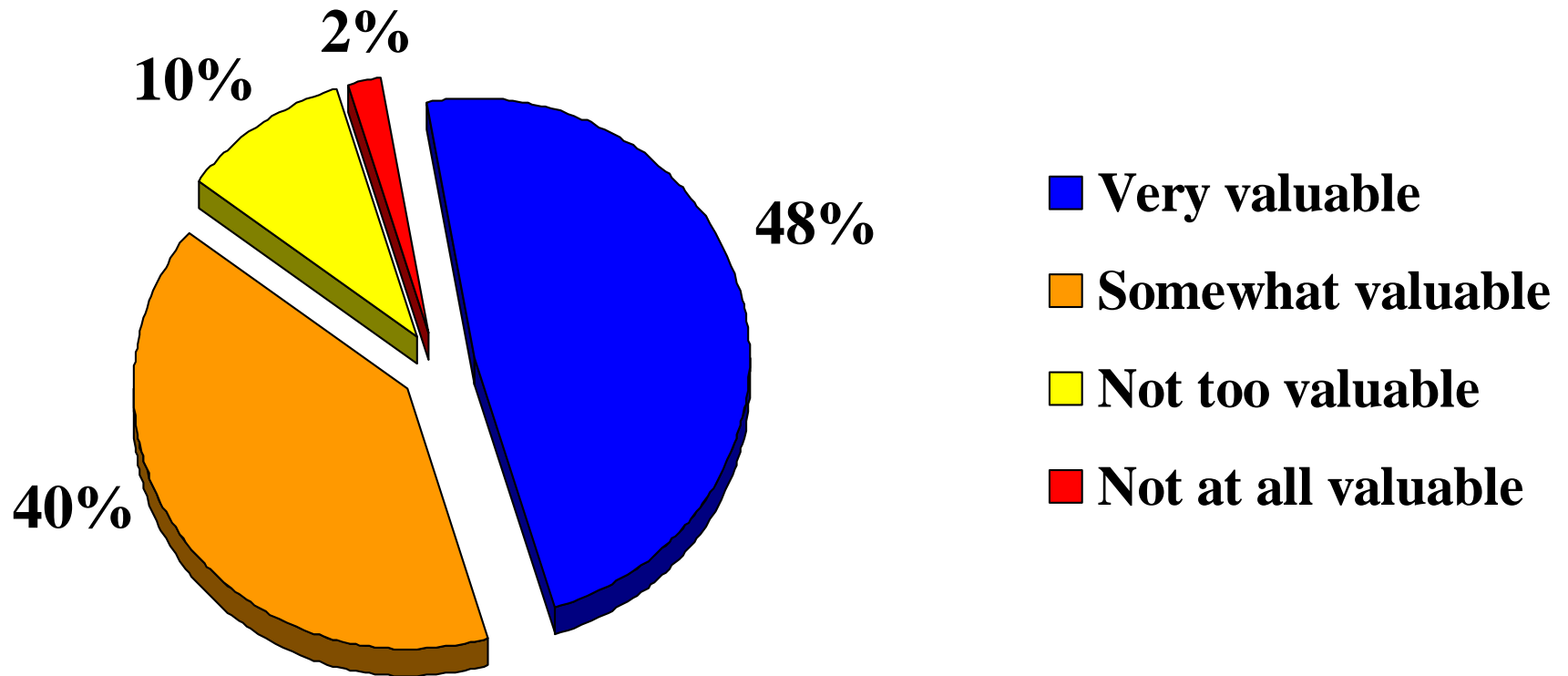

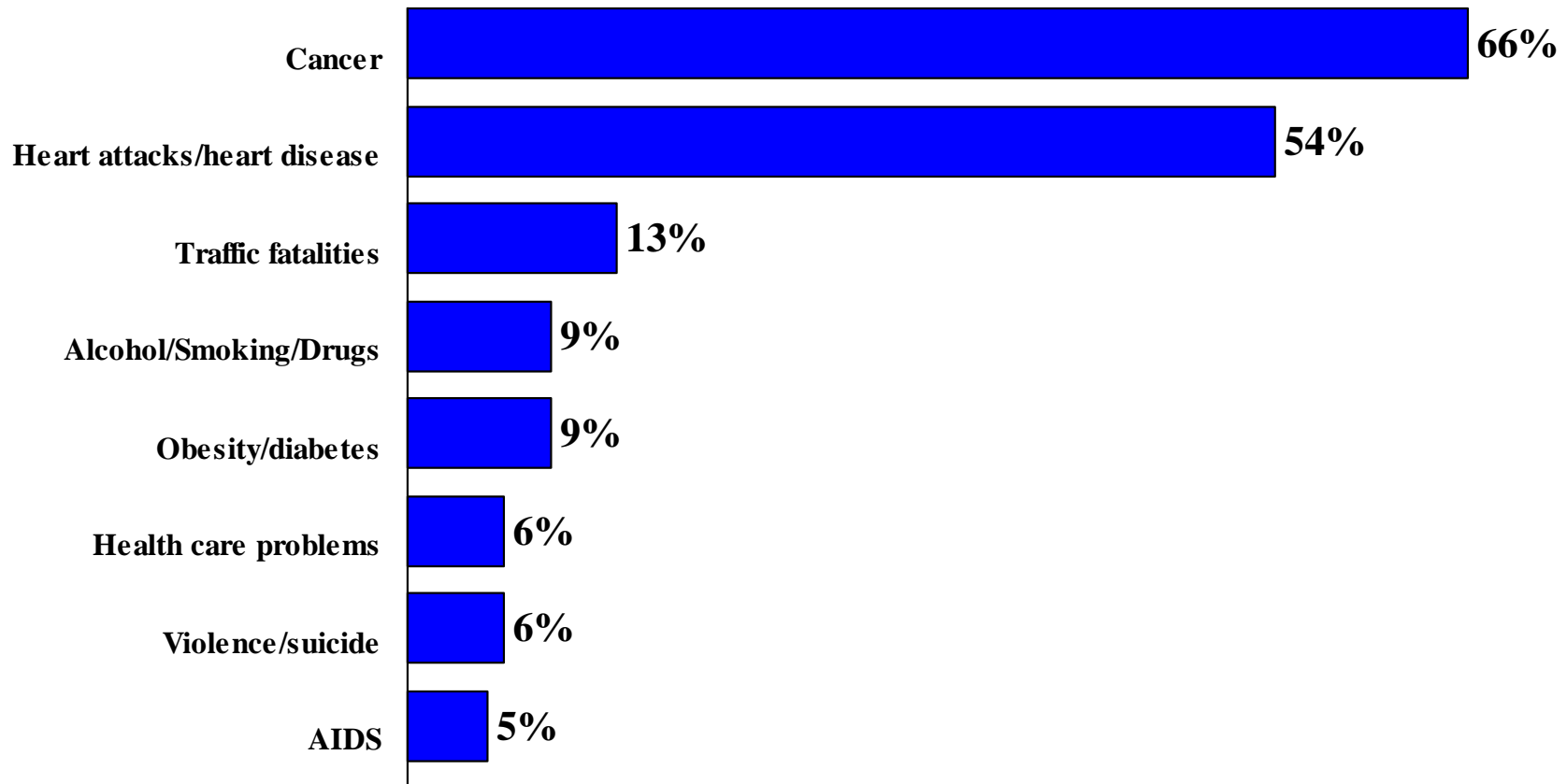
# U.S. Should Lead in Research to Improve Health Globally

*(total mentions)*

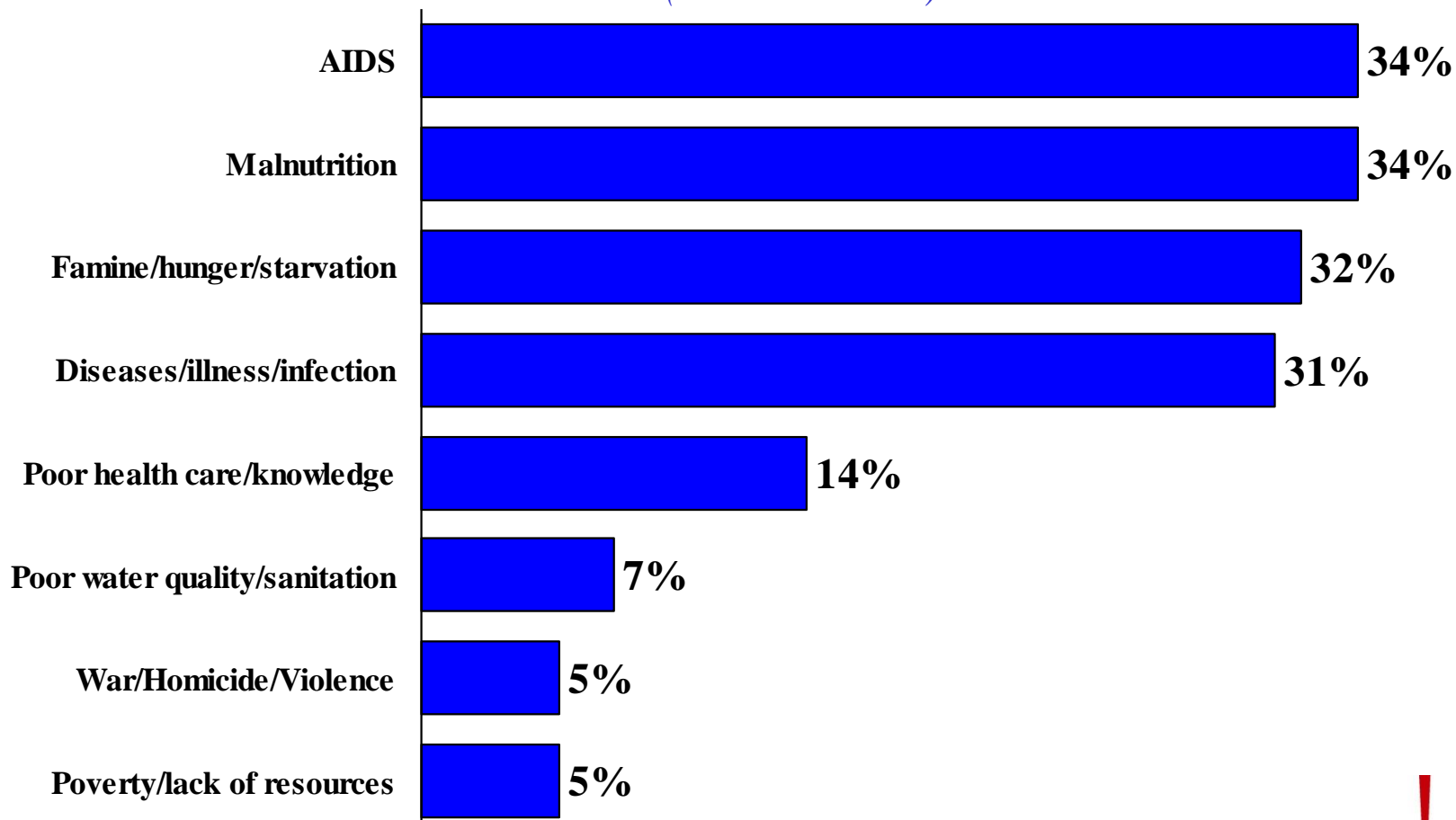

*(total mentions)*

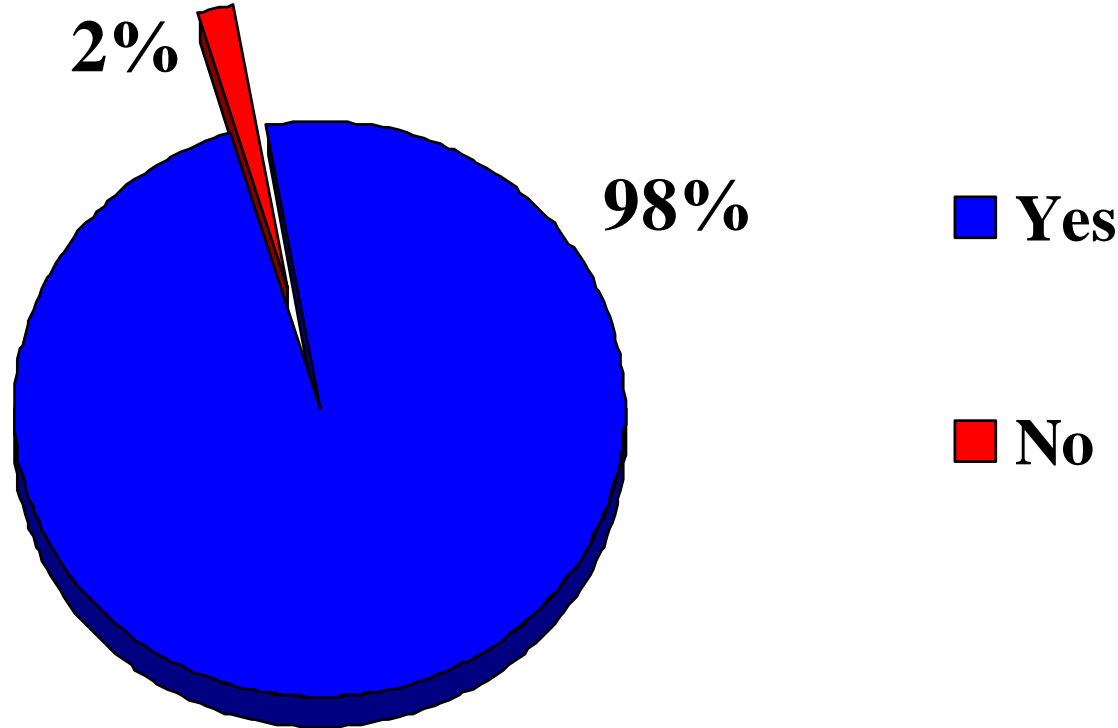

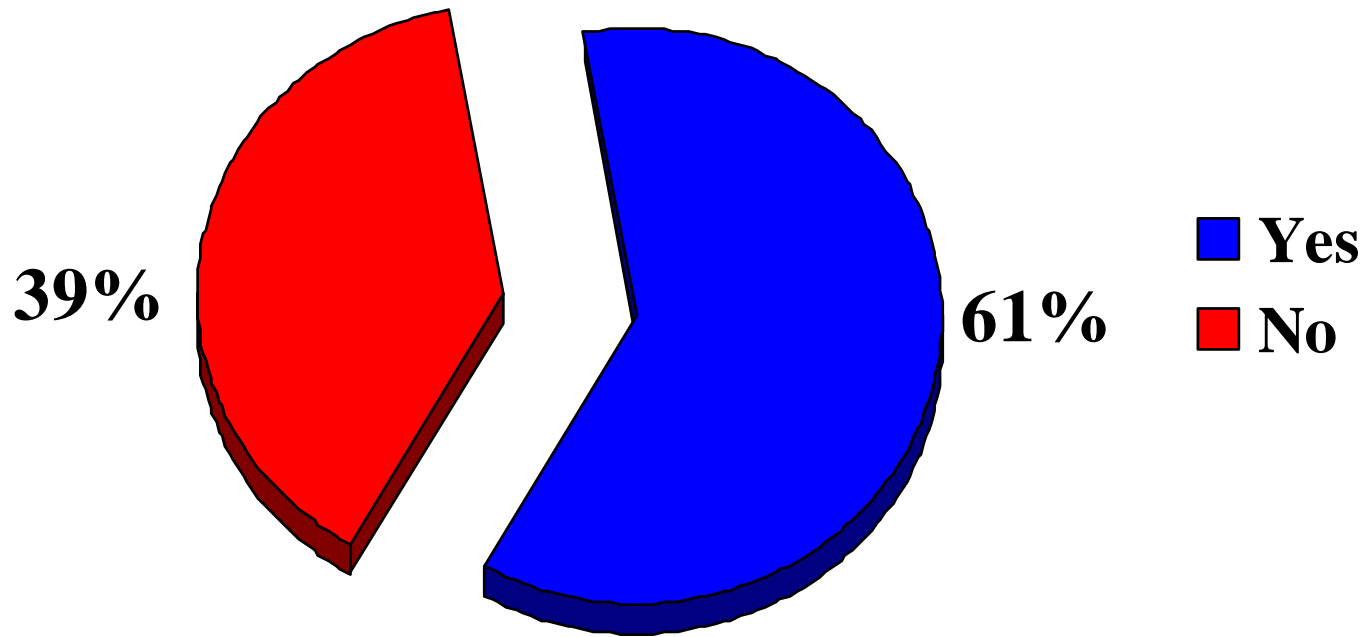
# U.S. Should Work to Prevent Violence

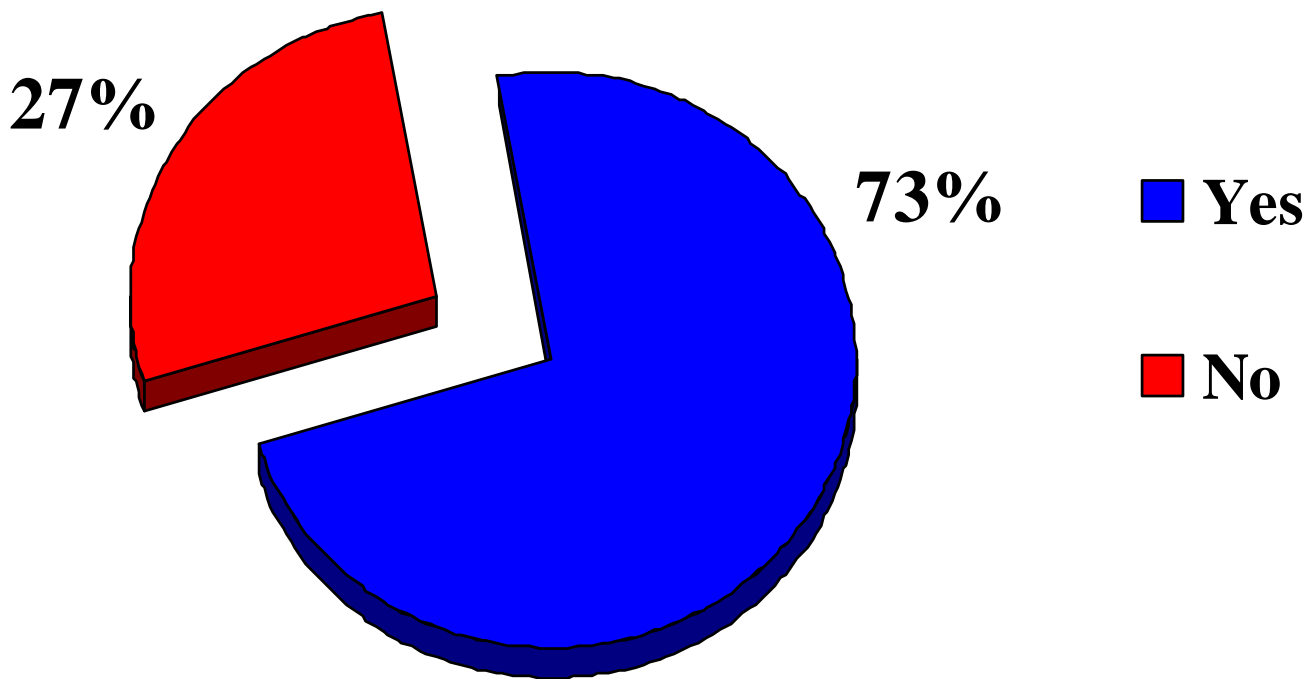

# Americans Worry About Diseases That Affect Poorer Countries

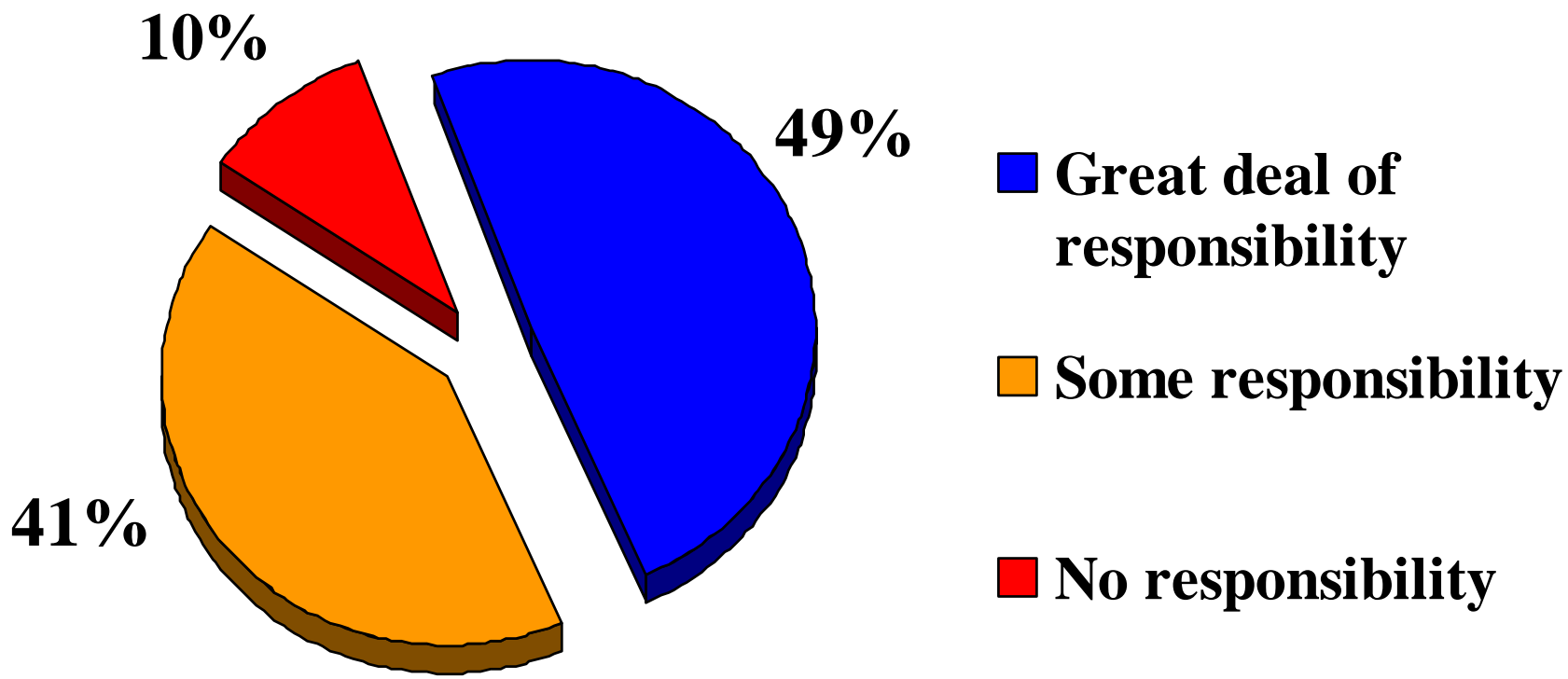
Should Americans worry about diseases- like malaria, dengue fever, and cholera- that mostly affect poorer countries?

# U.S. Has Responsibility to Conduct Research to Prevent Disease Globally

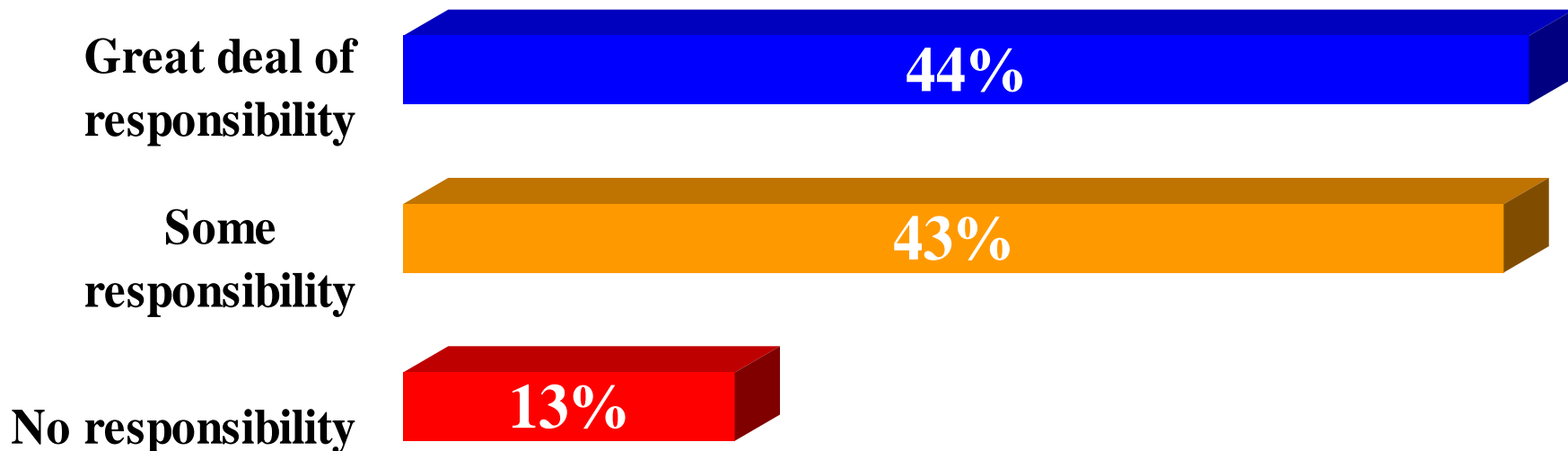
How much responsibility, if any, does the U.S. have to conduct research that would *prevent* diseases that disproportionately affect poorer countries?

# U.S. Has Responsibility for Treating Diseases in Poorer Countries

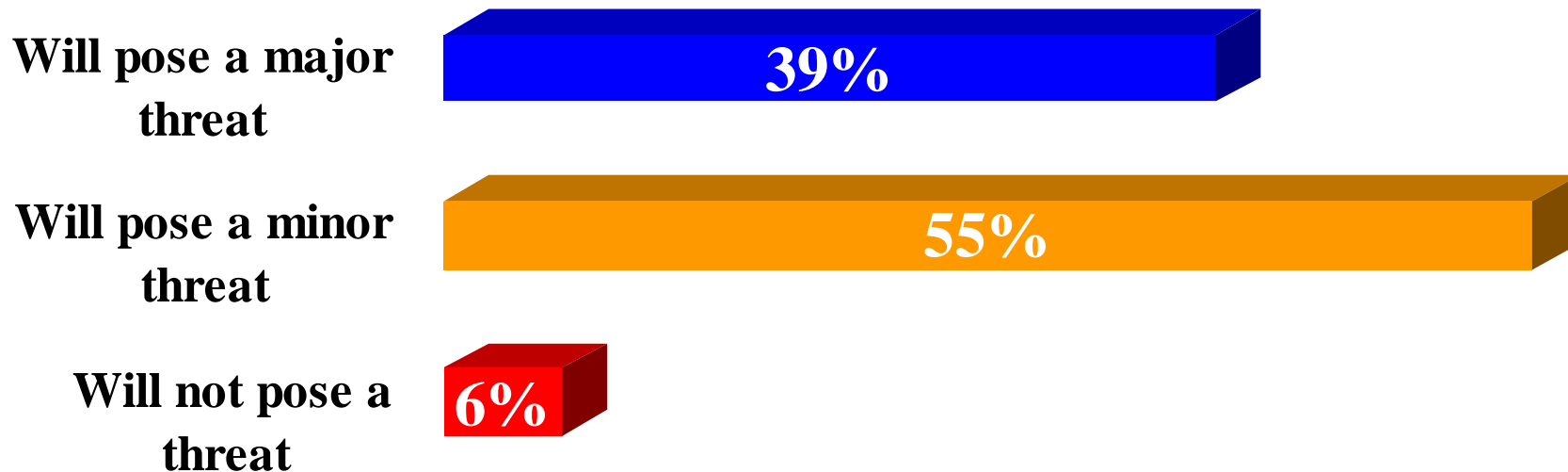
How much responsibility, if any, does the U.S. have to *treat* diseases that disproportionately affect poorer countries?

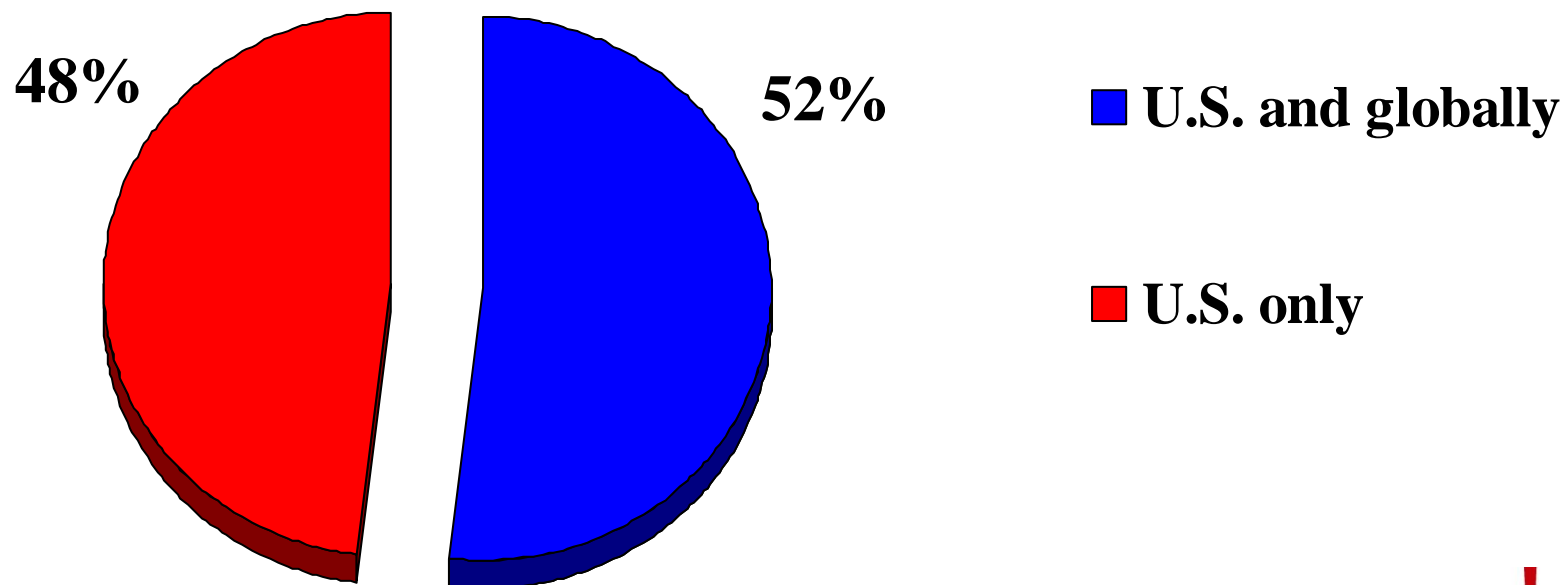


# U.S. Should Spend Tax Dollars on Improving Health

Some people say: The U.S. should spend its tax dollars on improving health in the U.S. only.

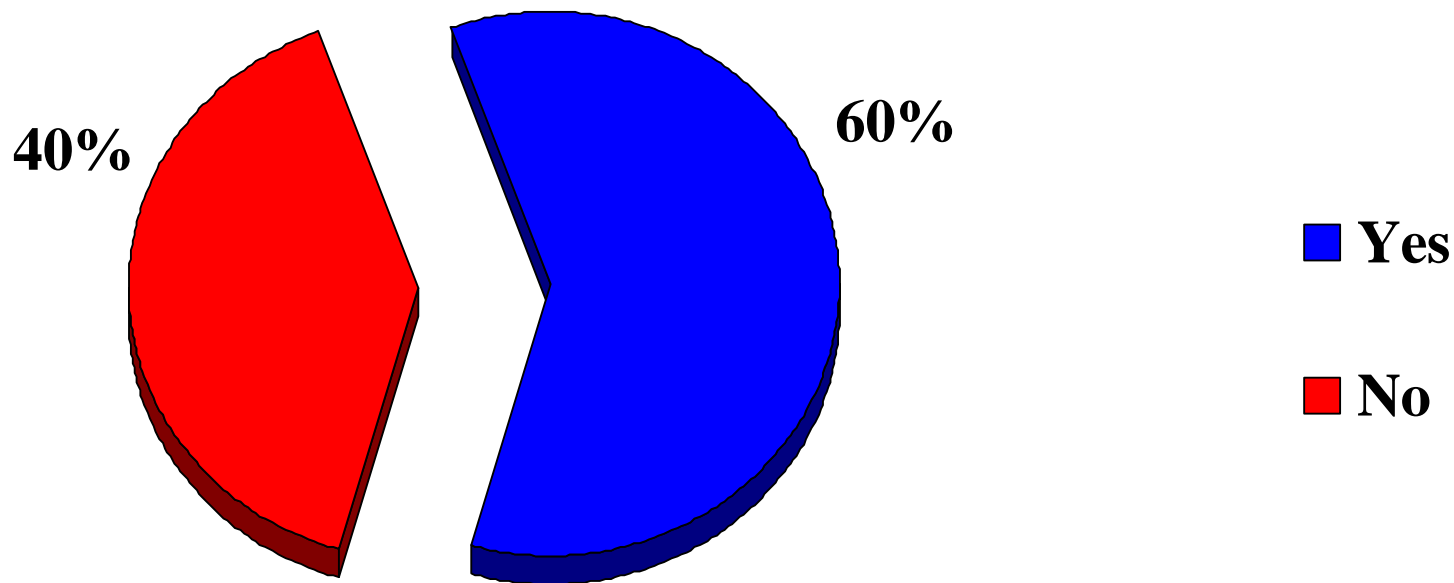
Other people say: The U.S. should spend its tax dollars on improving health in the U.S. and globally.

# Americans Willing to Pay More for Global Health

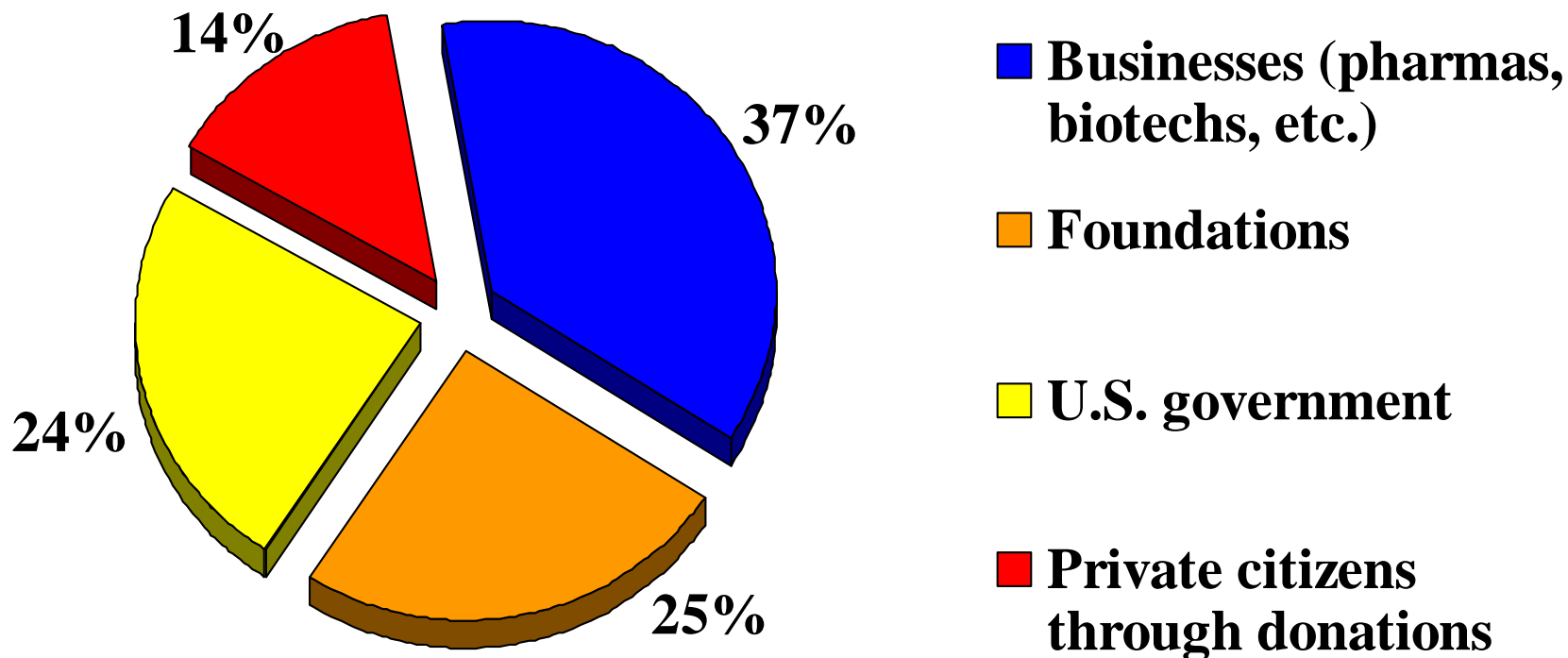
Would you be willing to pay \$1 per week more in taxes if you knew for sure that it would go towards the U.S. investing more in global health?

# Public and Private Sources Should Fund Global Health Research

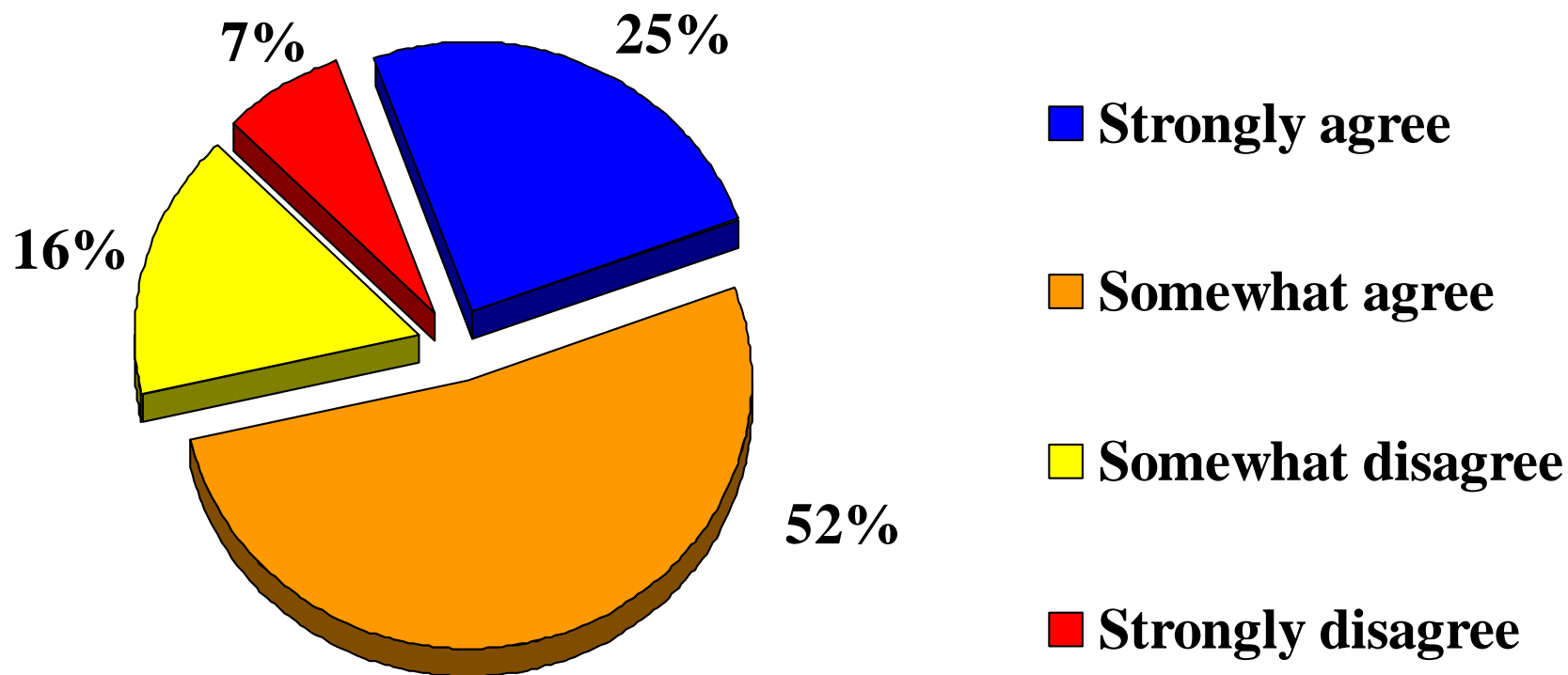
Who should be primarily responsible for funding global health research?

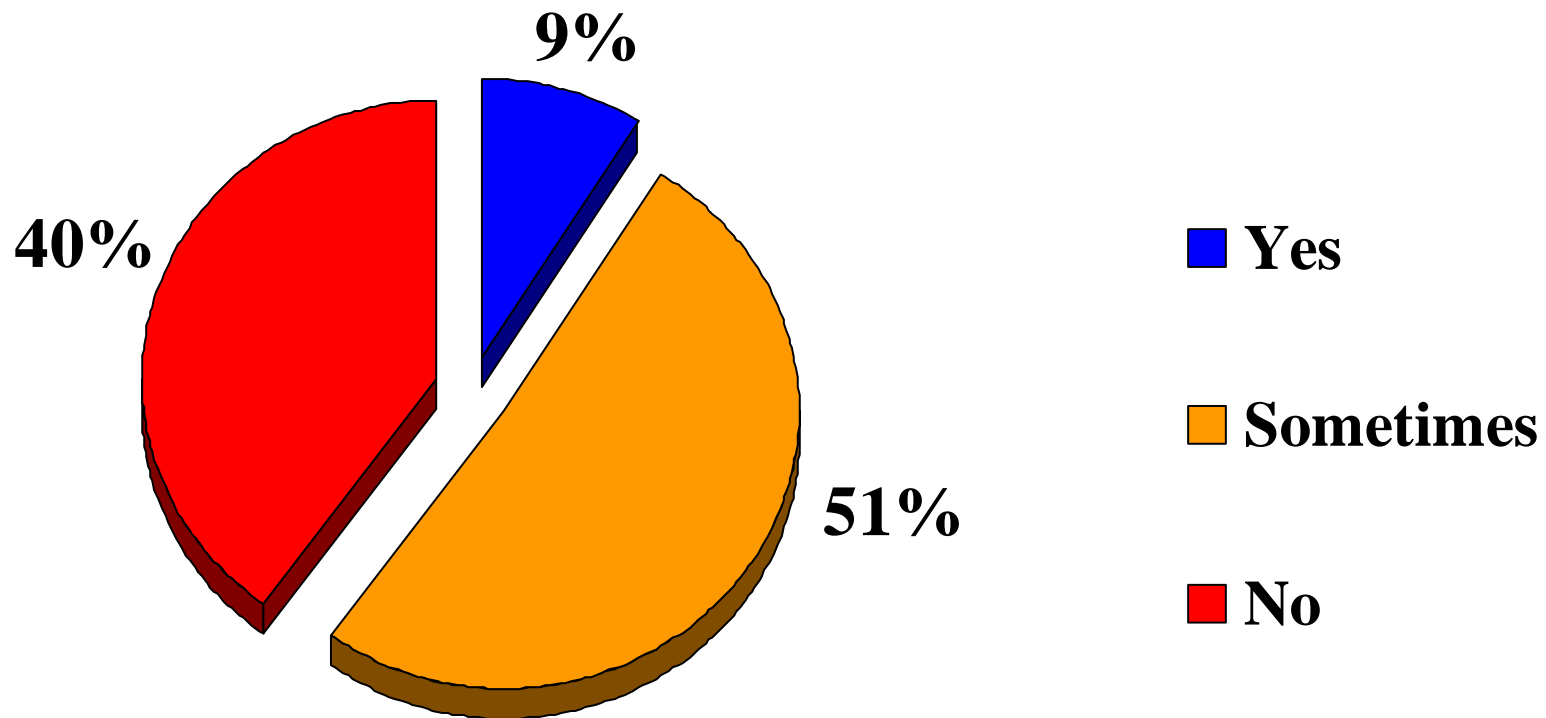
# Americans Better Off if U.S. Invests in Global Health Research

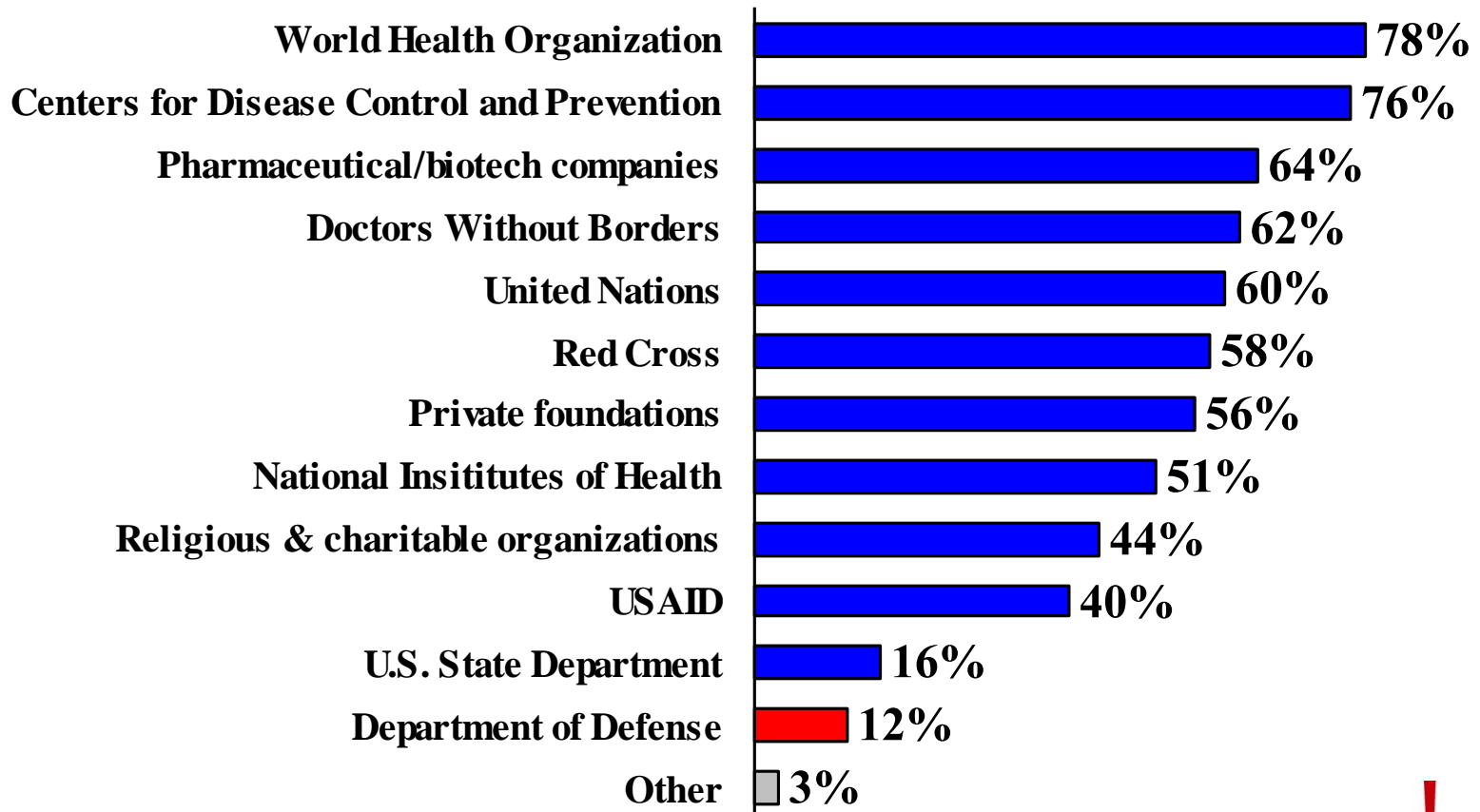
Are you currently doing something that you think will improve global health? If yes, what?





# Many Organizations *Should* be Involved in Global Health Research

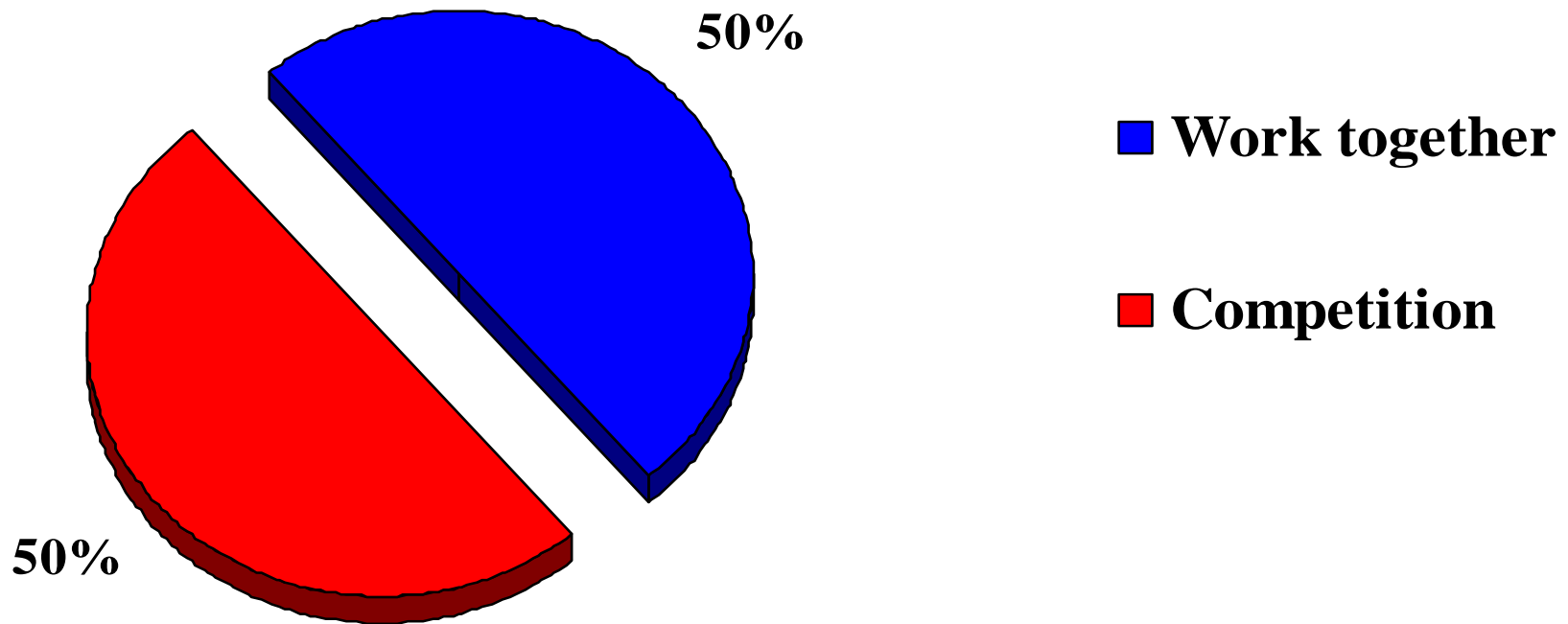
Which of the following government agencies and other types of organizations should be involved in research designed to improve health around the world?

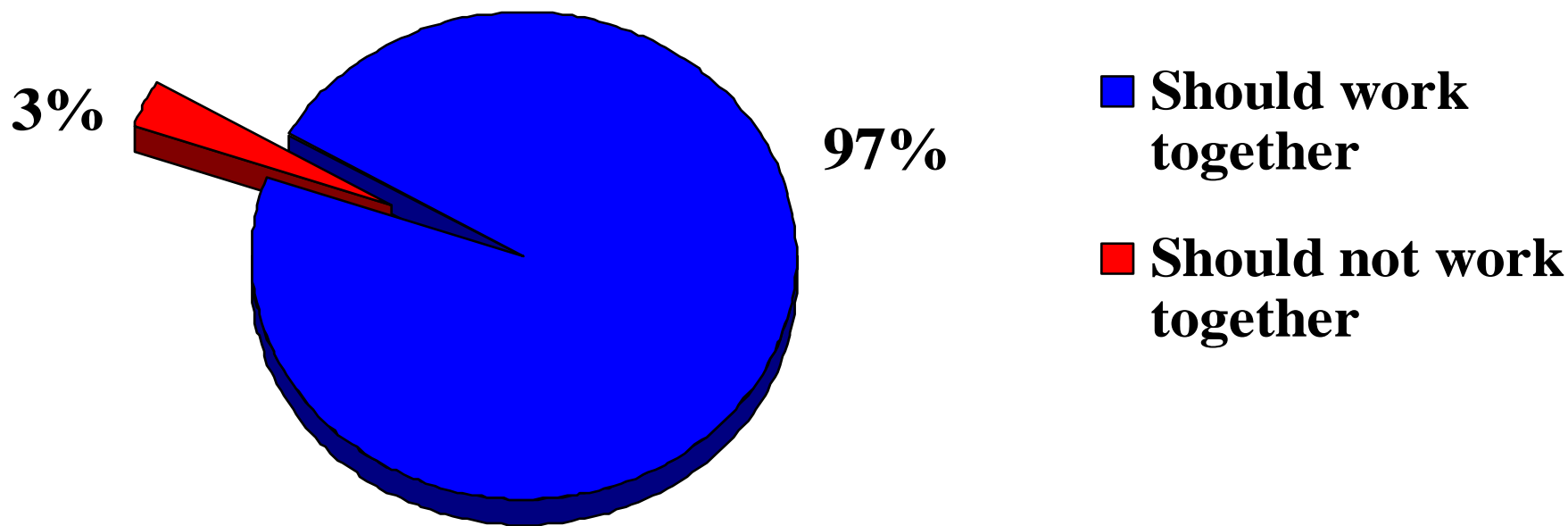
# Competition or Cooperation in Global Health Research?
