

How important do you think it is that presidential candidates talk about how science and scientific research will affect their policy-making decisions if they are elected?





To the best of your recollection, in the last 30-60 days, have you heard any of the candidates for president discuss science?





How important is it to you that candidates for president have a plan to address climate change?





How important is it to you that the U.S. be a world leader in science and technology research?






More Than Half of Iowans More Likely to Vote for Pro-Science Candidate

Do you think federal investment in mental health research has been adequate, not adequate, or about right?




