CBPR

An Approach more than a Method

- Community-based = from start to finish
 - Research design, objectives/aims, data collection, data analysis, dissemination of findings
- Participatory = participants are protagonists
 - Deeply collaborative process
- Action (CBPAR) = often action-oriented, seeks change
 - Not value-free science
- Methods may be qualitative or quantitative
 - Or arts-based!

"Community-based participatory research (CBPR) has emerged in the last decades as a transformative research paradigm that bridges the gap between science and practice through community engagement and social action to increase health equity."



Building Trust

Community members retain control over various aspects of the research process

- Especially important in populations with histories of abuses and/or mistrust
- Not an "extractive" process ongoing involvement through analysis and dissemination
- Democratizes the production of knowledge engages community members in that process




Populations of interest



Hard-to-Reach

- Inhabitants of Informal Settlements in Asuncion, Paraguay
- DACA Youth in Atlanta
- First Generation Latinx Students at Emory
- Unsheltered people in encampments in Providence



Challenges



- Relationships: entire process relies on the relationship between researchers and participants
- Capacity-building: engaging participants in data collection and analysis can be cumbersome (worth it!)
- Timeline: often requires 2x time to complete
 - Academe slows down publication cycle (with implications for tenure and promotion)

Community members as protagonists

Community members are at the center of the process

- Disrupt power differentials/hierarchies
- Reduce distance between academic and lay perspectives
- Privilege unheard or unamplified voices
- Enhance participant control over research outcomes
- Develop skills among community members

Meet Folks Where They Are

- Requires flexibility and adaptability
- Attention to specific contexts
 - Hot food
 - Meeting place dropping by
 - Informal conversation not all business



Opportunities Transforming Narratives

Creating Innovative Solutions

New Narratives

- Create space for new narratives starting from where they are rather than from where we are, or science is
- Generative activities capable of capturing and privileging new stories and themes
- Especially Arts-based methods

"Freedom University, wow, it was life changing. When I first got involved, I didn't know anyone, but I made a family there because I guess a lot of undocumented students don't open up in their school. I didn't. I never felt safe enough to disclose my status to my counselor or a teacher or anyone. So, after I graduated, at Freedom University you meet everyone and no one cares, or no one calls you an "illegal" or an "alien." They see us as a human being."

Creating Innovative Solutions

Activism among DACA Youth

- Empowerment across multiple areas
- Addressing GA ban on top state universities

I: Sounds like Freedom University has really opened your eyes but also opened doors to opportunities..

R: Yeah, it is really empowering especially in school since you are so used to hiding in the shadows and not wanting to let people know who you really are. It is really empowering and it is great seeing so many undocumented students and seeing like the power in their voice and the look in their eyes when they are chanting and like fighting for their rights.

Arts-Based Approaches

Digital Stories



- Combination of autobiographical storytelling with photography/images (and background music)
- Takes advantages of the "new" media which has dramatically shifted who is in control of information and media
- Interactive process of development, usually in small group environments with common themes

Body Mapping

People Living with HIV in South Africa, **Jane Solomon**, *Long Life* — *Positive HIV Stories*

The Method

Originated in South Africa as a therapeutic tool for women living with HIV

Body maps are the life-size human body images created by individuals

Body Mapping encompasses the process of creating body maps to visually represent aspects of people's lives, their bodies and the world they live in. There are many uses including advocacy, research, team building and evaluation


Photovoice
